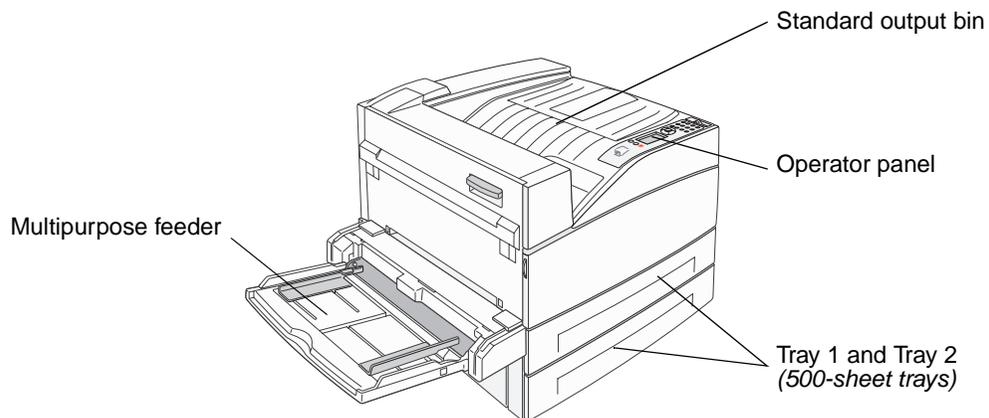

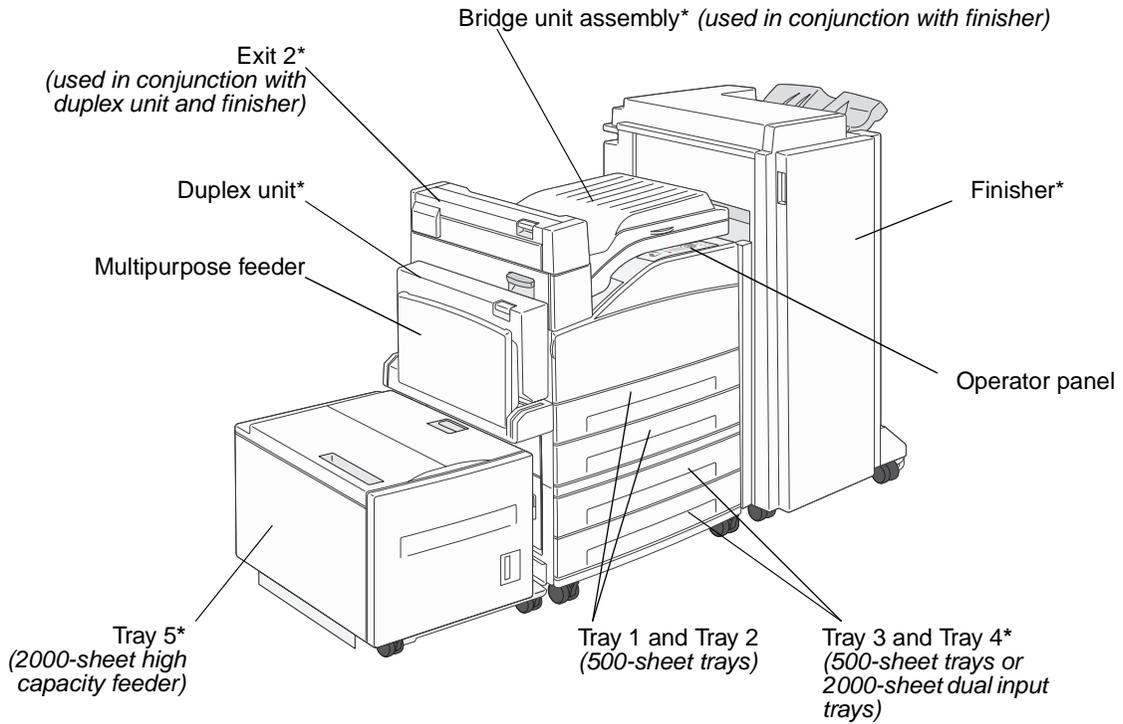
Basic model

The following illustration shows a printer with its base features.



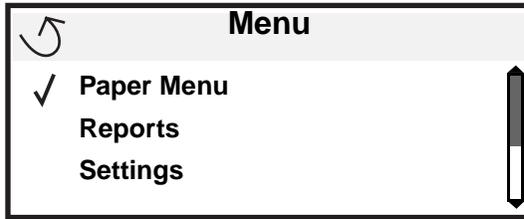
Configured model

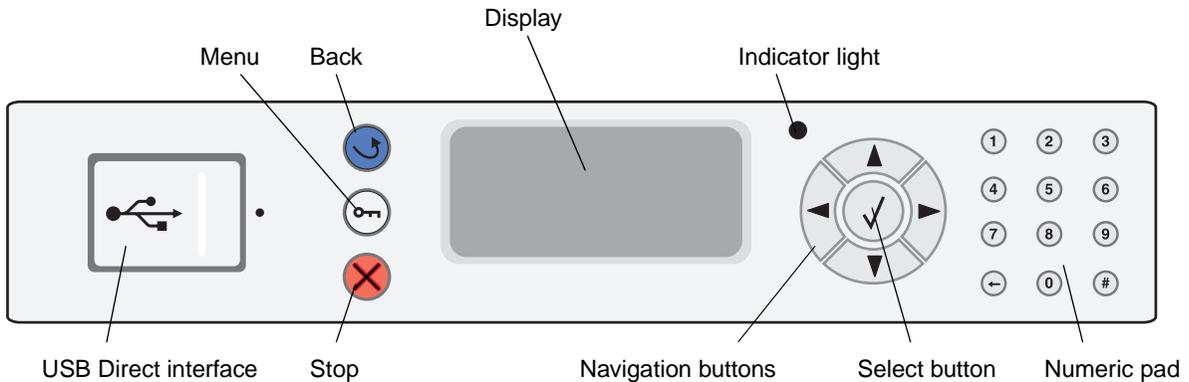

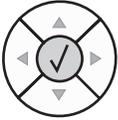
Understanding the printer operator panel

The operator panel consists of these items:

- A 4-line, back-lit, gray-scale display that can show both graphics and text
- Eight buttons: Back, Menu, Stop, Select (✓), ◀, ▶, ▲, and ▼
- Indicator light
- Numeric pad
- USB Direct Interface



The use of the buttons and the layout of the display panel are described in the following table.

Button or operator panel item	Function
Back 	Press the Back button to return to the last screen you viewed. Note: Changes made on a screen will not be applied if you press the Back button.
Menu 	Press the Menu button to open the menu index. Note: The printer must be in the Ready state to access the menu index. A message indicating the menus are unavailable will appear if the printer is not ready.
Stop 	Press the Stop button to stop the mechanical operation of the printer. After pressing Stop , the message stopping appears. When the printer has stopped, the status line in the operator panel will show stopped , and a list of options will appear.
Navigation buttons 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▲ The Up or Down buttons are used to move up and down lists. ▼ When navigating through a list using the Up or Down button, the cursor moves one line at a time. Pressing the Down button at the bottom of the screen changes the screen to the next whole page. ◀ ▶ The Left or Right buttons are used to move within a screen such as moving from one menu index item to another. They are also used to scroll through text that will not fit on the screen. ✓ The Select button is used to initiate action on a selection. Press Select when the cursor appears next to the selection you want such as following a link, submitting a configuration item, or when you want to start or cancel a job.

Installing drivers for local printing

A local printer is a printer attached to the computer using a USB or parallel cable. The local printer is intended to be used by the computer to which it is attached. If attaching a local printer, install the printer driver on the computer before setting up the printer.

The printer driver is software that lets the computer communicate with the printer.

The procedure to install drivers depends on the operating system used. Use the following table to find driver installation instructions for the particular operating system. For additional help, see the documentation that shipped with the computer and the software.

Windows

Some Windows operating systems may already include a printer driver that is compatible with the printer.

Note: Installing a custom driver will not replace the system driver. A separate printer object will be created and appear in the Printers folder.

Use the drivers CD that shipped with the printer to install the custom printer driver and obtain enhanced printer features and functionality.

Drivers are also available in downloadable software packages on the Lexmark Web site at www.lexmark.com.

Using Windows Server 2003, Windows 2000, Windows XP, Windows 98 SE, Windows Me, or Windows NT

Note: Install the printer software before connecting the USB cable.

- 1 Insert the drivers CD.

If the CD does not launch automatically, click **Start** → **Run**, and type `D:\Setup.exe` in the Run dialog (where D is the letter of the CD-ROM drive).

Note: USB support is not available for Windows NT operating systems.

Installing drivers for local printing

- 2 Click **Install Printer and Software**.

Note: Some Windows operating systems require that the user has administrative access to install printer drivers on the computer.

- 3 Click **Agree** to accept the license agreement.

- 4 Select **Suggested**, and click **Next**.

The Suggested option is the default installation for local and network-attached setup. To install utilities, change settings, or customize device drivers, select **Custom**, and follow the instructions on the screen.

- 5 Select **Local Attach**, and click **Finish**.

Follow the instructions on the screen. It may take some time for the drivers to load.

- 6 Close the drivers CD installer application.

- 7 Connect the USB cable, and turn on the printer.

The Plug and Play screen appears, and a printer object is created in the printers folder of the computer.

Using Windows 95 and Windows 98 (first edition)

- 1 Turn on the computer.

- 2 Insert the drivers CD. If the CD launches automatically, click **Exit** to return to the Add Printer Wizard.

- 3 Click **Start** → **Settings** → **Printers**, and double-click **Add Printer**.

Note: USB support is not available for Windows 95 and Windows 98 (first edition) operating systems.

- 4 When prompted, select **Local printer**.

- 5 Click **Have Disk**.

Note: Some Windows operating systems require that the user has administrative access to install printer drivers on the computer.

- 6 Specify the location of the custom printer driver on the drivers CD.

The path should be similar to the following:

D:\Drivers\Print\Win_9xMe\<language>

Where D is the letter of the CD-ROM drive.

- 7 Click **OK**.

It may take some time for the drivers to load.

- 8 Close the drivers CD.

Serial printing

With serial printing, data is transferred one bit at a time. Although serial printing is usually slower than parallel printing, it is the preferred option when there is a great deal of distance between the printer and computer, or when a parallel interface is not available.

Note: A serial interface card is required and can be purchased separately.

Before printing, establishing communication between the printer and computer is required. To do this:

- 1 Set serial parameters in the printer.
- 2 Install a printer driver on the attached computer.
- 3 Match the serial settings in the COM port.

Setting parameters in the printer

- 1 Press  on the operator panel.
- 2 Press  until  **Network/Ports** appears, and then press .
- 3 Press  until  **Serial Option X** appears, and then press .
- 4 Press  until  **<Parameter>** appears, and then press  (where **<Parameter>** is the parameter required for a change).
- 5 Press  until  **<Setting>** appears, and then press  (where **<Setting>** is the setting required for a change).

Note the following restrictions:

- Maximum baud rate supported is 115,200.
 - Data Bits must be set to 7 or 8.
 - Parity must be set to Even, Odd, or None.
 - Stop Bits must be set to 2.
 - Flow Control recommended protocol setting is Xon/Xoff.
- 6 Press  repeatedly to return the printer to the Ready state.
 - 7 Print a Menu Settings page, and verify that the serial parameters are correct.

Note: Keep this page for later use.

- a Press  on the operator panel.
- b Press  until  **Reports** appears, and then press .
- c Press  until  **Menu Settings Page** appears, and then press .
- d Look under the Standard Serial (or Serial Option X if a serial interface card is installed) heading to find the serial parameters.

Installing a printer driver

A printer driver must be installed on the computer that is connected to the printer.

Note: Windows 95 and Windows 98 (first edition) users should follow the installation directions in **Using Windows 95 and Windows 98 (first edition)**.

- 1 Insert the drivers CD. It should launch automatically. If the CD does not launch automatically, click **Start → Run**, and type the following in the Run dialog:

D: \Setup.exe

Where D is the letter of the CD-ROM drive.

Installing drivers for local printing

- 2 Click **Install Printer and Software**.
- 3 Click **Agree** to accept the Printer Software License Agreement.
- 4 Select **Custom**, and click **Next**.
- 5 Select **Components**, and click **Next**.
- 6 Select **Local**, and click **Next**.
- 7 Select the printer from the list, and click **Add Printer**.
- 8 Expand the printer item listed below Selected Components.
- 9 Click **PORT: <LPT1>**, and select the communications port (COM1 or COM2) needed for use.
- 10 Click **Finish** to complete the printer software installation.

Setting parameters in the communications (COM) port

After the printer driver is installed, the serial parameters must be set for the communications port assigned to the printer driver.

The serial parameters in the communications port must match exactly to the serial parameters set in the printer.

- 1 Click **Start → Settings → Control Panel**, and double-click **System**.
- 2 On the **Device Manager** tab, click **+** to expand the list of available ports.
- 3 Select the communications port assigned to the printer (COM1 or COM2).
- 4 Click **Properties**.
- 5 On the **Port Settings** tab, set the serial parameters to the exact same serial parameters in the printer.
Look for the printer settings under the Serial Standard (or Serial Option X) heading on the Menu Settings page printed previously.
- 6 Click **OK**, and close all the windows.
- 7 Print a test page to verify printer installation.
 - a Click **Start → Settings → Printers**.
 - b Select the printer just added.
 - c Click **File → Properties**.
 - d Click **Print Test Page**. When a test page prints successfully, printer setup is complete.

Macintosh

Mac OS 9.x or later is required for USB printing. To print locally to a USB-attached printer, create a desktop printer icon (Mac OS 9) or create a queue in Print Center / Printer Setup Utility (Mac OS X).

Creating a queue in Print Center / Printer Setup Utility (Mac OS X)

1 Install a PostScript Printer Description (PPD) file on the computer.

- a Insert the drivers CD.
- b Double-click the installer package for the printer.

Note: A PPD file provides detailed information about the capabilities of a printer to the Macintosh computer.

- c Click **Continue** on the Welcome screen and again after viewing the Readme file.
- d Click **Continue** after viewing the license agreement, and click **Agree** to accept the terms of the agreement.
- e Select a Destination, and click **Continue**.
- f On the Easy Install screen, click **Install**.
- g Enter the user password, and click **OK**. All the necessary software is installed on the computer.
- h Click **Close** when installation is complete.

2 Open Finder, click **Applications**, and click **Utilities**.

3 Double-click **Print Center** or **Printer Setup Utility**.

Note: A PPD for the printer is also available in a downloadable software package on the Lexmark Web site at www.lexmark.com.

4 Do one of the following:

- If the USB-attached printer appears in the Printer List, quit Print Center or Printer Setup Utility. A queue has been created for the printer.
- If the USB-attached printer does not appear in the Printer List, make sure the USB cable is properly connected and the printer is turned on. After the printer appears in the Printer List, quit Print Center or Printer Setup Utility.

Creating a desktop printer icon (Mac OS 9.x)

1 Install a PostScript Printer Description (PPD) file on the computer.

- a Insert the drivers CD.
- b Double-click **Classic**, and double-click the installer package for the printer.

Note: A PPD file provides detailed information about the capabilities of a printer to the Macintosh computer.

- c Choose the language needed for use, and click **Continue**.
- d Click **Continue** after viewing the Readme file.
- e Click **Continue** after viewing the license agreement, and click **Agree** to accept the terms of the agreement.
- f On the Easy Install screen, click **Install**. All the necessary files are installed on the computer.
- g Click **Close** when installation is complete.

Note: A PPD for the printer is also available in a downloadable software package on the Lexmark Web site at www.lexmark.com.

Installing drivers for local printing

- 2 Do one of the following:
 - For *Mac OS 9.0*: Open **Apple LaserWriter**.
 - For *Mac OS 9.1–9.x*: Open **Applications**, and click **Utilities**.
- 3 Double-click **Desktop Printer Utility**.
- 4 Select **Printer (USB)**, and click **OK**.
- 5 In the USB Printer Selection section, click **Change**.

If the printer does not appear in the USB Printer Selection list, make sure the USB cable is properly connected, and the printer is turned on.
- 6 Select the name of the printer, and click **OK**. The printer appears in the original Printer (USB) window.
- 7 In the PostScript Printer Description (PPD) File section, click **Auto Setup**. Make sure the printer PPD now matches the printer in use.
- 8 Click **Create**, and click **Save**.
- 9 Specify a printer name, and click **Save**. The printer is now saved as a desktop printer.

UNIX/Linux

Local printing is supported on many UNIX and Linux platforms, such as Sun Solaris and Red Hat.

The Sun Solaris and Linux packages are available on the drivers CD and on the Lexmark Web site at www.lexmark.com. The UNIX/Linux *User's Guide* in each package gives detailed instructions for installing and using Lexmark printers in UNIX and Linux environments.

All the printer driver packages support local printing using a parallel connection. The driver package for Sun Solaris supports USB connections to Sun Ray appliances and Sun workstations.

Installing drivers for network printing

Printing a network setup page

If the printer is attached to a network, print a network setup page on the printer to verify the network connection. This page also provides important information that helps in configuring for network printing.

- 1 Make sure the printer is on.
- 2 Press  on the operator panel.
- 3 Press  until  **Reports** appears, and then press .
- 4 Press  until  **Network Setup Page** appears, and then press .

Note: If an optional internal print server is installed, **Print Net1 Setup** appears on the display.

- 5 Check the first section on the network setup page, and confirm that Status is “Connected.”

If Status is “Not Connected” the LAN drop may not be active, or the network cable may be malfunctioning. Consult a system support person for a solution, and print another network setup page to verify that the printer is connected to the network.

Assigning a printer IP address

If the network is using DHCP, an IP address is automatically assigned after connecting the network cable to the printer.

- 1 Look for the address under the “TCP/IP” heading on the network setup page printed in **Printing a network setup page**.
- 2 Go to **Verifying the IP settings**, and begin with step 2.

If the network is not using DHCP, then manually assign an IP address to the printer. One of the easiest ways is to use the operator panel:

- 1 Press  on the operator panel.
- 2 Press  until  **Network/Ports** appears, and then press .
- 3 Press  until  **TCP/IP** appears, and then press .

Standard Network appears if the printer has a network port on the printer system board. If an internal print server is installed in the option card, **Network Option 1** appears.

- 4 Press  until  **Address** appears, and then press .
- 5 Using the numeric pad, enter the IP address. Once the address is entered, press .
submitting selection appears briefly.
- 6 Press  until  **Netmask** appears, and then press .
- 7 Using the numeric pad, enter the IP address. Once the address is entered, press .
submitting selection appears briefly.
- 8 Press  until  **Gateway** appears, and then press .

Installing drivers for network printing

- 9 Using the numeric pad, enter the IP address. Once the address is entered, press . **submitting selection** appears briefly.
- 10 Press  repeatedly until the printer returns to **Ready**.

Verifying the IP settings

- 1 Print another network setup page. Look under the “TCP/IP” heading, and make sure the IP address, netmask, and gateway are correct. See **Printing a network setup page on page 17** if help is needed.
- 2 Ping the printer, and verify that it responds. At a command prompt on a network computer, type `ping` followed by the new printer IP address (for example, `192.168.0.11`).

Note: On Windows computers, click **Start → Programs → Command prompt** (or **Accessories → Command prompt** if using Windows 2000).

If the printer is active on the network, a reply is sent.

After the TCP/IP settings are assigned and verified, install the printer on each network computer.

Windows

In Windows environments, network printers can be configured for direct printing or shared printing. Both network printing methods require the installation of a printer driver and the creation of a network printer port.

Supported printer drivers

- Windows system printer driver
- Lexmark custom printer driver

System drivers are built into Windows operating systems. Custom drivers are available on the drivers CD.

Updated system and custom drivers are available on the Lexmark Web site at www.lexmark.com.

Supported network printer ports

- Microsoft Standard TCP/IP port—Windows 2000, Windows XP, and Windows Server 2003
- LPR—Windows NT 4.0
- Lexmark Enhanced TCP/IP port—Windows 98 SE/Me, Windows NT 4.0, Windows 2000, Windows XP, and Windows Server 2003

For basic printer functionality, install a system printer driver and use a system network printer port, such as an LPR or a Standard TCP/IP port. The system printer driver and port allow for a consistent user interface for use with all the printers on the network. However, using a custom printer driver and network port provides enhanced functionality, such as printer status alerts.

To install a custom printer driver and network port:

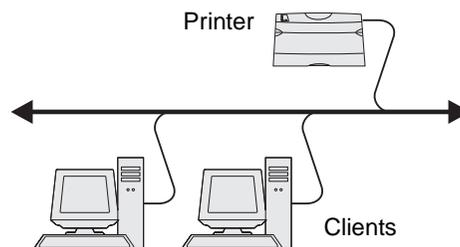
- 1 Launch the drivers CD.
- 2 Click **Install Printer and Software**.
- 3 Click **Agree** to accept the license agreement.
- 4 Select **Suggested**, and click **Next**.
- 5 Select **Network Attach**, and click **Next**.
- 6 Select the printer model from the list, and click **Next**.
- 7 Select the printer port from the list, and click **Finish** to complete the installation.

If the printer port is not listed:

- a Click **Add Port**.
- b Select **Lexmark Enhanced TCP/IP Port**, and enter the information to create the port.
- c Enter a port name.
This can be any name to associate with the printer, such as **Co1or1-1ab4**. After the port is created, this name appears in the list of available ports.
- d Enter the IP address in the text box.

Note: If the IP address is unknown, print a network setup page, and look under the TCP/IP heading. For help, see **Printing a network setup page** and **Verifying the IP settings**.

- 8 Print a test page to verify printer installation.



Installing drivers for network printing

Shared printing using Windows NT 4.0, Windows 2000, Windows XP, or Windows Server 2003

Note: Install the printer software before connecting the USB cable.

After connecting the printer to a Windows NT 4.0, Windows 2000, Windows XP, or Windows Server 2003 computer (which will act as a server), follow these steps to configure the network printer for shared printing:

1 Install a custom printer driver.

- a** Launch the drivers CD.
- b** Click **Install Printer and Software**.
- c** Click **Agree** to accept the license agreement.
- d** Select **Suggested**, and click **Next**.

The Suggested option is the default installation for local and network-attached setup. To install utilities, change settings, or customize device drivers, select **Custom**, and follow the instructions on the screen.

- e** Select **Local Attach**, and click **Finish**.

Follow the instructions on the screen. It may take some time for the drivers to load.

- f** Close the drivers CD installer application.
- g** Connect the USB cable, and turn on the printer.

The Plug and Play screen appears, and a printer object is created in the Printers folder of the computer. The printer is shared in step 2: "Share the printer on the network."

- h** Print a test page to verify printer installation.

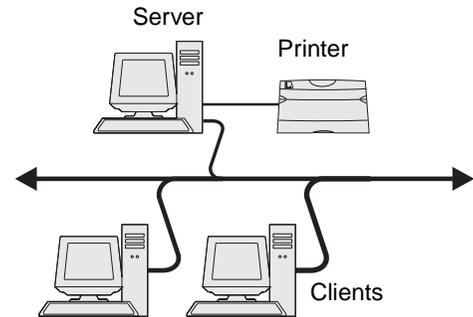
2 Share the printer on the network.

- a** Click **Start** → **Settings** → **Printers**.
- b** Select the printer just added.
- c** Click **File** → **Sharing**.
- d** Select the **Shared as** check box, and enter a name in the text box.
- e** In the Alternate Drivers section, select the operating systems of all the network clients that will print to the printer.
- f** Click **OK**.

Note: If files are missing, prompts may appear to request the server operating system CD.

g Check the following to make sure the printer was successfully shared.

- The printer object in the Printers folder now has a shared indicator. For example, in Windows NT 4.0, a hand appears under the printer object.
- Browse Network Neighborhood. Find the host name of the server, and look for the shared name assigned to the printer.



Install the printer driver (or subset) on network clients

Using the point and print method

Note: This method is usually the best use of system resources. The server handles driver modifications and the print job processing. This lets network clients return to applications much faster.

With this method, a subset of driver information is copied from the server to the client computer. This is just enough information to send a print job to the printer.

- 1 Double-click **Network Neighborhood** on the Windows desktop of the client computer.
- 2 Locate the host name of the server computer, and double-click the host name.
- 3 Right-click the shared printer name, and click **Install**.

Wait a few minutes for the driver information to be copied from the server computer to the client computer and for a new printer object to be added to the Printers folder. The time this takes varies based on network traffic and other factors.

- 4 Close **Network Neighborhood**.
- 5 Print a test page to verify printer installation.

Using the peer-to-peer method

With this method, the printer driver is fully installed on each client computer. Network clients retain control of driver modifications. The client computer handles the print job processing.

- 1 Click **Start** → **Settings** → **Printers**.
- 2 Click **Add Printer** to launch the Add Printer wizard.
- 3 Click **Next**.
- 4 Click **Network Printer**, and click **Next**.
- 5 Enter the printer name or URL (if on the Internet or an intranet), and click **Next**.
If the printer name or URL is unknown, leave the text box blank, and click **Next**.
- 6 Select the network printer from the Shared printers list. If the printer is not listed, enter the path of the printer in the text box.

The path looks similar to the following:

```
\\<server host name>\<shared printer name>
```

Note: If this is a new printer, prompts may occur to install a printer driver. If no system driver is available, provide a path to available drivers.

The server host name is the name of the server computer that identifies it to the network. The shared printer name is the name assigned during the server installation process.

- 7 Click **OK**.
- 8 Select whether this printer will be the default printer for the client, and click **Finish**.
- 9 Print a test page to verify printer installation.

Configuring Drag‘N’Print

Note: Drag‘N’Print™ support is not available for all printers.

For detailed configuration instructions, launch the drivers CD, click **View Documentation**, and click **Software and utilities**.

Macintosh

Note: A PostScript Printer Description (PPD) file provides detailed information about the capabilities of a printer to UNIX or Macintosh computers.

To print to a network printer, each Macintosh user must install a custom PostScript Printer Description (PPD) file, and either create a desktop printer on the computer (Mac OS 9.x) or create a print queue in Print Center (Mac OS X).

Mac OS X

Step 1: Install a custom PPD file

- 1 Install a PostScript Printer Description (PPD) file on the computer.
 - a Insert the drivers CD.
 - b Double-click the installer package for the printer.

Note: A PPD file provides detailed information about the capabilities of a printer to the Macintosh computer.

- c Click **Continue** on the Welcome screen and again after viewing the Readme file.
- d Click **Continue** after viewing the license agreement, and click **Agree** to accept the terms of the agreement.
- e Select a Destination, and click **Continue**.
- f On the Easy Install screen, click **Install**.
- g Enter the user password, and click **OK**. All the necessary software is installed on the computer.
- h Click **Close** when installation is complete.

Step 2: Create a print queue in Print Center or Printer Setup Utility

Using AppleTalk Printing

Follow these steps to create a print queue using AppleTalk Printing.

- 1 Open Finder, click **Applications**, and click **Utilities**.
- 2 Double-click **Print Center or Printer Setup Utility**.
- 3 Choose **Add Printer** from the "Printers" menu.
- 4 Choose **AppleTalk** from the pop-up menu.

Note: Look on the network setup page under the "AppleTalk" heading to know which zone or printer to select.

- 5 Select the AppleTalk zone from the list.
- 6 Select the new printer from the list, and click **Add**.
- 7 Verify printer installation:
 - a Open Finder, click **Applications**, and click **TextEdit**.
 - b Choose **Print** from the "File" menu.
 - c Choose **Summary** from the "Copies & Pages" pop-up menu.

Note: Look on the Network Setup page under the "AppleTalk" heading to find the default name of the printer to know which printer to select.

Installing drivers for network printing

- If the PPD file displayed in the Summary window is correct for the printer, then printer setup is complete.
- If the PPD file displayed in the Summary window is *not* correct for the printer, delete the printer from the printer list in Print Center or Printer Setup Utility, and repeat **Step 1: Install a custom PPD file**.

Using IP Printing

Follow these steps to create a print queue using IP Printing. To create an AppleTalk print queue, see **Step 2: Create a print queue in Print Center or Printer Setup Utility**.

- 1 Open Finder, click **Applications**, and click **Utilities**.
- 2 Double-click **Print Center or Printer Setup Utility**.
- 3 Choose **Add Printer** from the "Printers" menu.
- 4 Choose **IP Printing** from the pop-up menu.
- 5 Enter the IP address or the printer DNS name in the Printer Address box.
- 6 Choose **Lexmark** from the "Printer Model" pop-up menu.
- 7 Select the new printer from the list, and click **Add**.
- 8 Verify printer installation:
 - a Open Finder, click **Applications**, and click **TextEdit**.
 - b Choose **Print** from the "File" menu.
 - c Choose **Summary** from the "Copies & Pages" pop-up menu.
 - d Do one of the following:
 - If the PPD file displayed in the Summary window is correct for the printer, then printer setup is complete.
 - If the PPD file displayed in the Summary window is *not* correct for the printer, delete the printer from the printer list in Print Center or Printer Setup Utility, and repeat **Step 1: Install a custom PPD file**.

Mac OS 9.x

Step 1: Install a custom PPD file

- 1 Insert the drivers CD.
 - a Double-click **Classic**, and double-click the installer package for the printer.

Note: A PPD file provides detailed information about the capabilities of a printer to the Macintosh computer.

- b Choose the language needed for use, and click **Continue**.
- c Click **Continue** after viewing the Readme file.
- d Click **Continue** after viewing the license agreement, and click **Agree** to accept the terms of the agreement.
- e On the Easy Install screen, click **Install**. All the necessary files are installed on the computer.
- f Click **Close** when installation is complete.

Note: A PPD for the printer is also available in a downloadable software package on the Lexmark Web site at www.lexmark.com.

Step 2: Create a desktop printer

- 1 In the Chooser, select the **LaserWriter 8** driver.
- 2 For a routed network, select the default zone from the list. For the zone to select, look on the Network Setup page under AppleTalk for Zone.
- 3 Select the new printer from the list.
- 4 For printer to select, look on the Network Setup page under the “AppleTalk” heading to find the default name of the printer.
- 5 Click **Create**.
- 6 Make sure there is an icon next to the printer name in the Chooser.
- 7 Close the Chooser window.
- 8 Verify printer installation.
 - a Click the desktop printer icon just added.
 - b Choose **Printing** → **Change Setup**.
 - If the PPD file displayed in the PostScript Printer Description (PPD) file portion of the menu is correct for the printer, printer setup is complete.
 - If the PPD file displayed in the PostScript Printer Description (PPD) file portion of the menu is *not* correct for the printer, repeat **Step 1: Install a custom PPD file**.

UNIX/Linux

The printer supports many UNIX and Linux platforms, such as Sun Solaris and Red Hat. Visit the Lexmark Web site at www.lexmark.com for a complete list of supported UNIX and Linux platforms.

NetWare

The printer supports Novell Distributed Print Services (NDPS/iPrint). For the latest information about installing a network printer in a NetWare environment, launch the drivers CD, and click **View Documentation**.

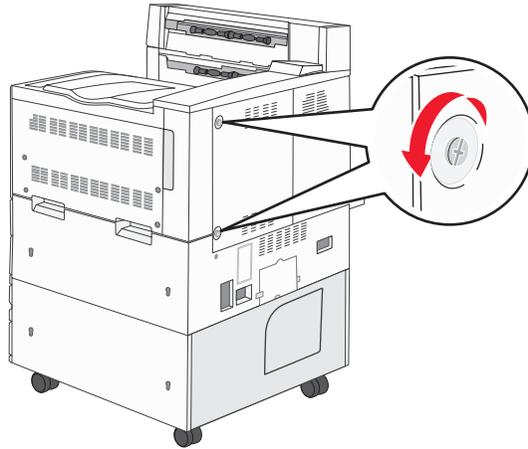

Accessing the printer system board

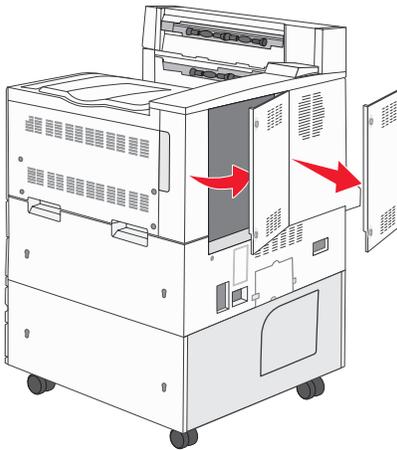
You must access the printer system board to install printer memory, flash memory, a hard disk, or an option card.

CAUTION: Turn the printer off, and unplug the power cord before continuing.

- 1 Loosen the screws on the access panel located on the back side of the printer.

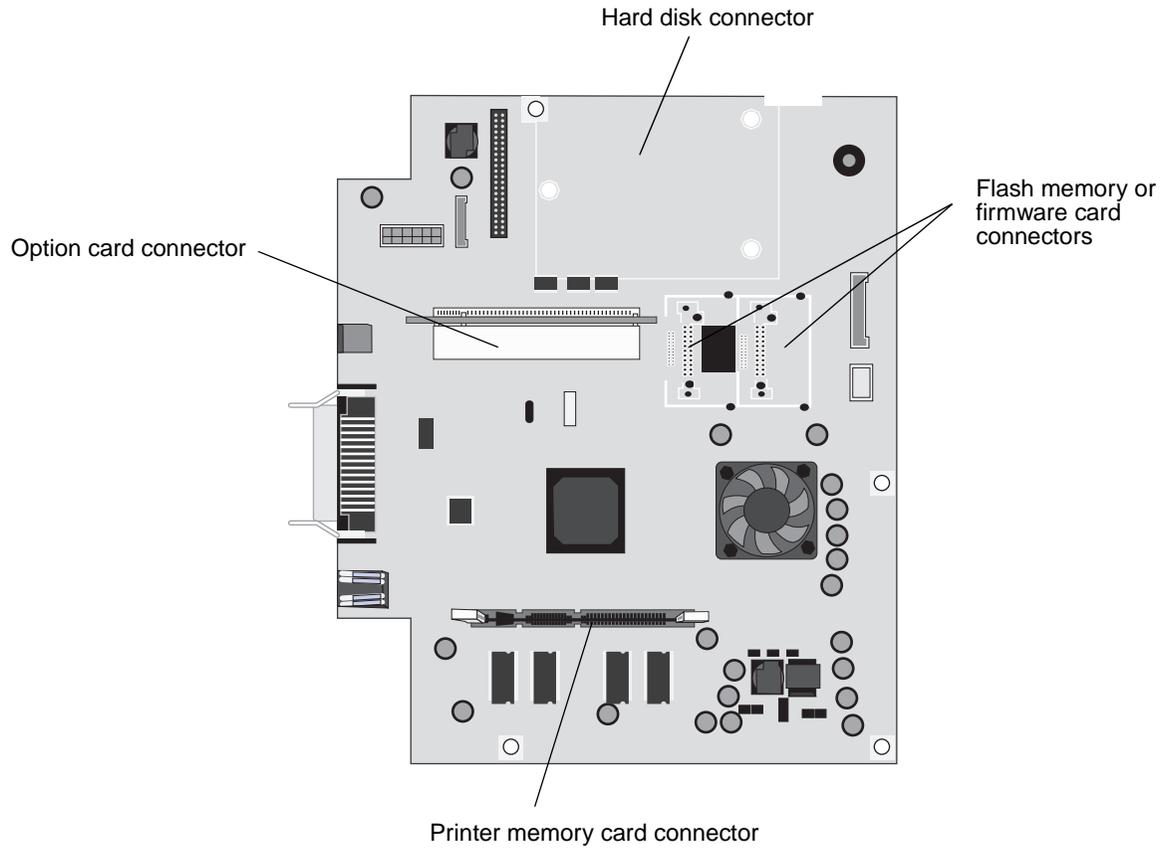


- 2 Remove the panel from the printer, and set it aside.

Installing a printer memory card

Complete the following instructions to install a printer memory card.

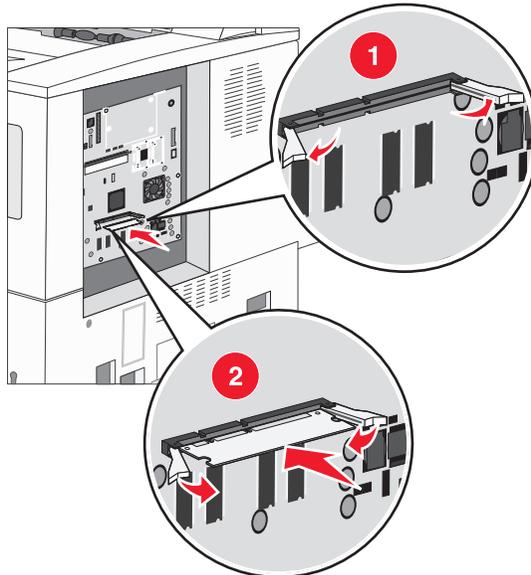
Note: Memory cards designed for other Lexmark printers may not work with your printer.

- 1 Remove the system board access panel. (See **Accessing the printer system board.**)
- 2 Push open the latches on both ends of the memory card connector.
- 3 Unpack the memory card.

Warning: Printer memory cards are easily damaged by static electricity. Touch something metal such as the printer frame before you touch a memory card.

Avoid touching the connection points along the edge of the card. Save the packaging.

- 4 Align the notches on the bottom of the card with the notches on the connector.
- 5 Push the memory card firmly into the connector until the latches on either end of the connector *snap* into place. It may require some force to fully seat the card.



- 6 Make sure each latch fits over the notch on the end of the card.

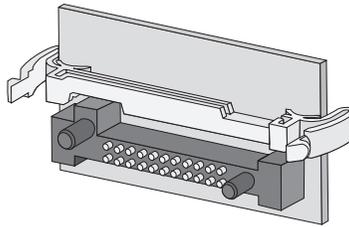
Installing a flash memory or firmware card

Note: Flash memory and firmware cards designed for other Lexmark printers may not work with your printer.

- 1 Remove the system board access panel. (See **Accessing the printer system board.**)
- 2 Unpack the flash memory or firmware card.

Warning: Flash memory and firmware cards are easily damaged by static electricity. Touch something metal such as the printer frame before you touch a card.

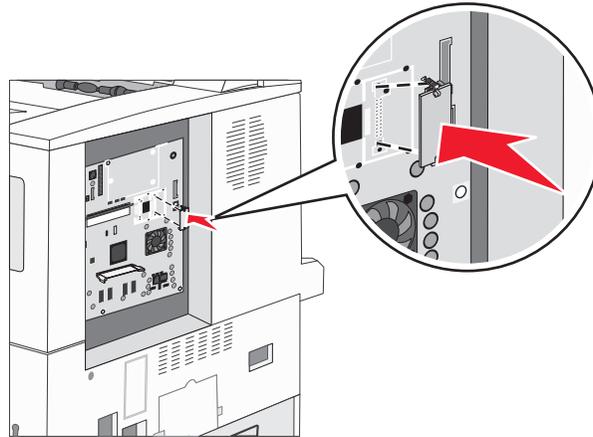
- 3 Holding the flash memory or firmware card by the locking clips, align the plastic pins on the card with the holes on the system board.



- 4 Push the flash memory or firmware card firmly into place, and release the locking clips.

The entire length of the connector on the flash memory or firmware card must touch the system board and be locked into the connector.

Be careful not to damage the connectors.

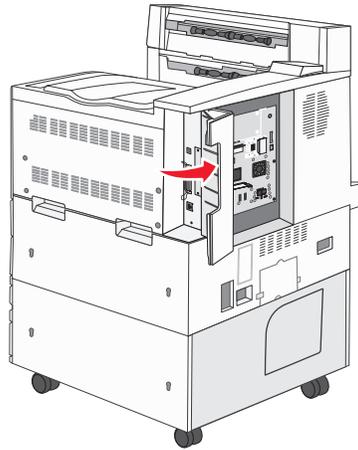

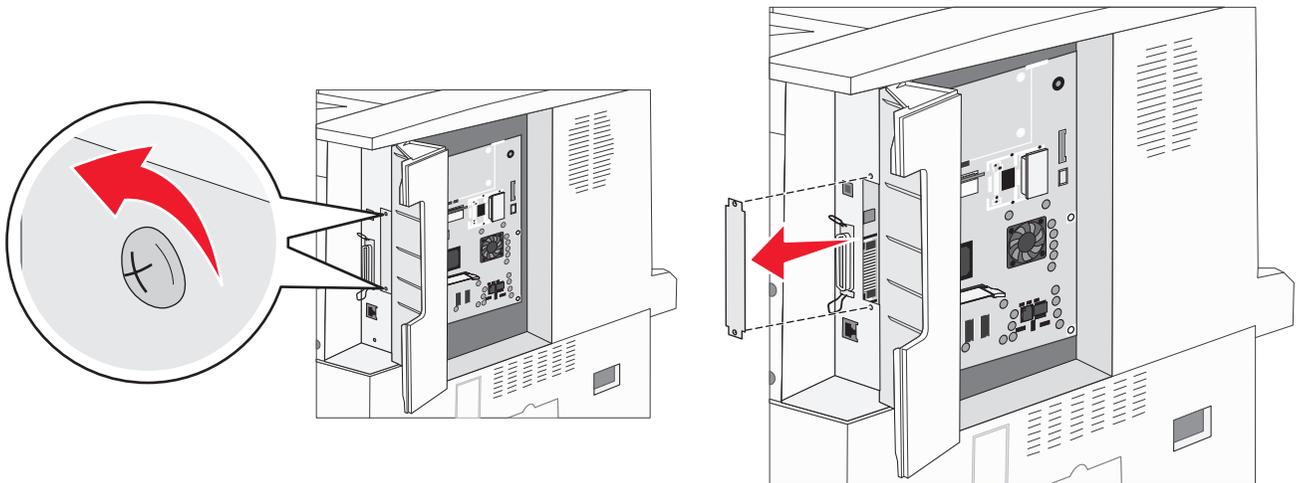
Warning: Option cards are easily damaged by static electricity. Touch something metal such as the printer frame before you touch a memory card.

- 2 Open the system board door.



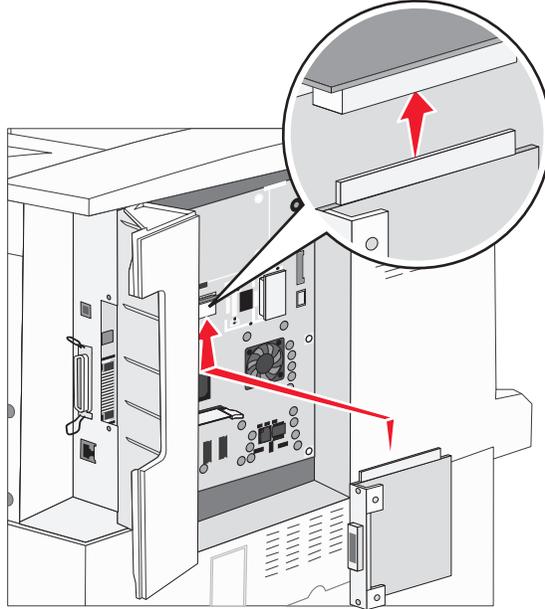
- 3 Locate the card connector on the system board.
- 4 Remove the screws and the cover plate, and save them.



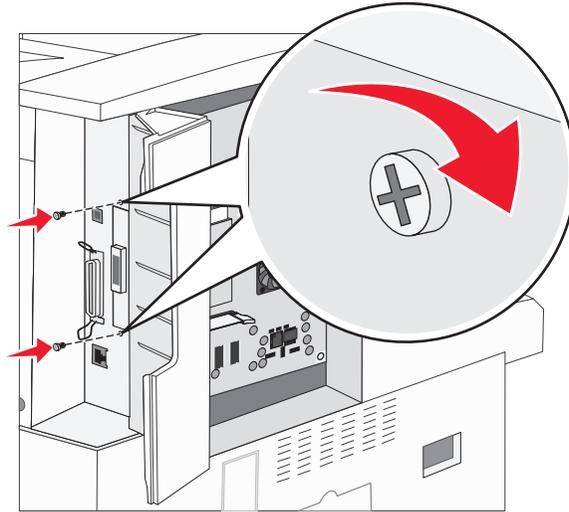
- 5 Unpack the card. Save the packaging materials.

- 6 Align the connection points on the card with the connector on the system board, and push the card firmly into the system board connector.



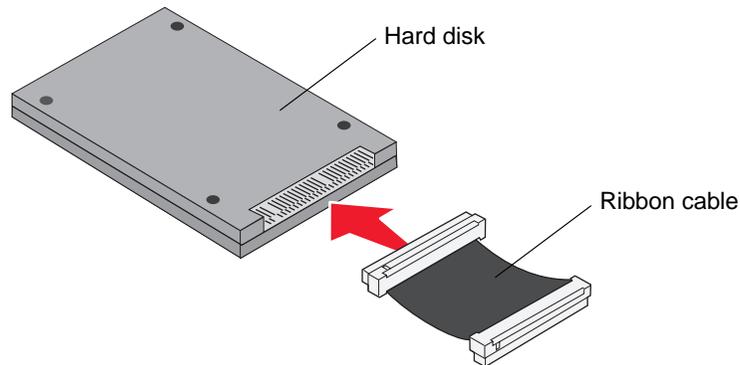
- 7 Insert the screws saved from the cover plate (or the extra screws shipped with the card).
- 8 Tighten the screws to secure the card.



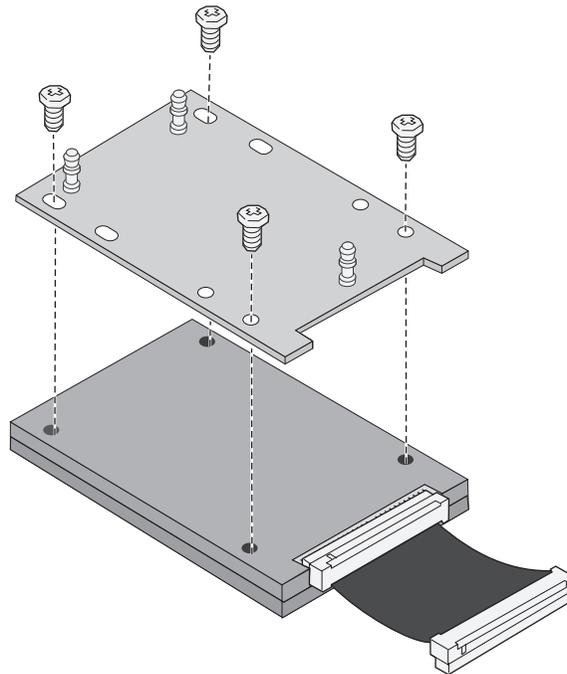
Installing a hard disk

- 4 Attach the ribbon cable to the hard disk.

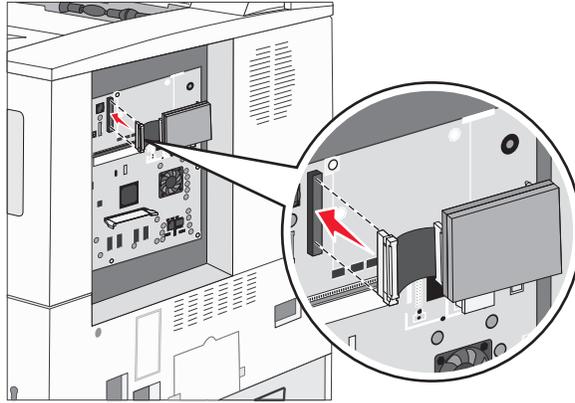


- 5 Align the screw holes on the mounting plate with the holes in the hard disk.
- 6 Secure the mounting plate to the hard disk with the screws.

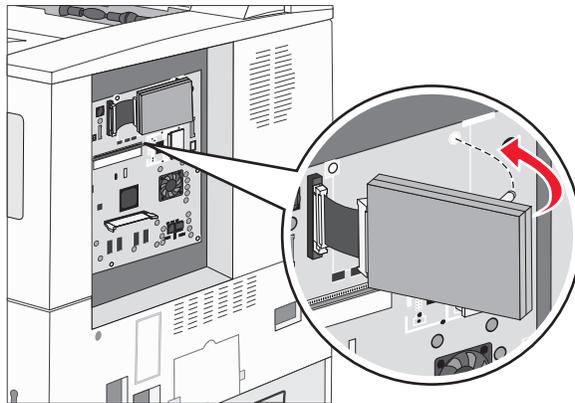

- 7 Press the ribbon cable connector into the connector on the system board.



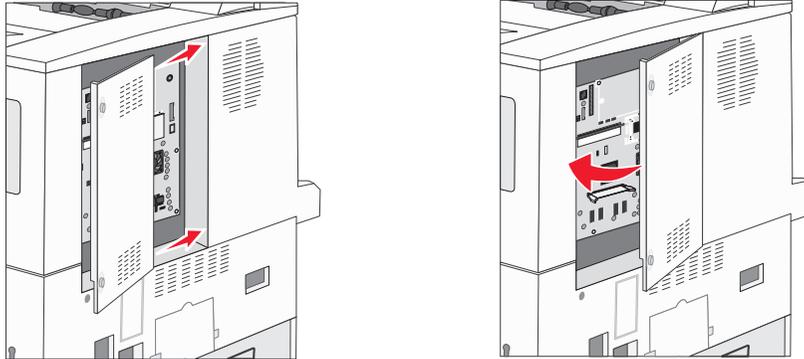
- 8 Press the three posts on the mounting plate into the holes on the system board. The hard disk *snaps* into place.



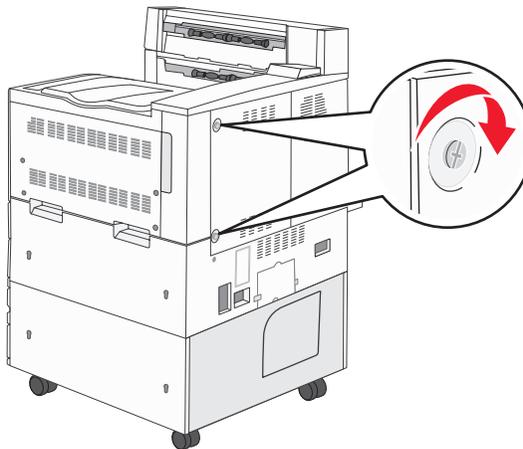
Replacing the access panel

After you have installed options on the printer system board, follow these steps to reattach the access panel.

- 1 Align the tabs on the right side of the access panel with the slots on the printer.
- 2 Slide the panel to the right and towards the printer.



- 3 Tighten the screws.



- 4 Plug the printer power cord back into a properly grounded electrical outlet and turn on the printer.

Selecting print media

Selecting the appropriate print media for the printer helps you avoid printing problems. The following sections contain guidelines for choosing the correct print media for the printer.

- **Paper**
- **Transparencies**
- **Envelopes**
- **Labels**
- **Card stock**

Paper

To ensure the best print quality and feed reliability, use 90 g/m² (24 lb) xerographic, grain long paper. Business papers designed for general business use may also provide acceptable print quality.

We recommend Lexmark part number 12A5950 letter size glossy paper and Lexmark part number 12A5951 for A4 size glossy paper.

Always print several samples before buying large quantities of any type of media. When choosing any media, consider the weight, fiber content, and color.

The laser printing process heats paper to high temperatures of 230°C (446°F) for non-MICR applications. Use only paper able to withstand these temperatures without discoloring, bleeding, or releasing hazardous emissions. Check with the manufacturer or vendor to determine whether the paper chosen is acceptable for laser printers.

When loading paper, note the recommended print side on the paper package, and load paper accordingly. For detailed tray loading instructions, see the following:

Paper characteristics

The following paper characteristics affect print quality and reliability. It is recommended that these guidelines are followed when evaluating new paper stock.

For detailed information, see the *Card Stock & Label Guide* available on the Lexmark Web site at www.lexmark.com/publications.

Weight

The printer can automatically feed paper weights from 60 to 176 g/m² (16 to 47 lb bond) grain long in the integrated and optional trays and paper weights from 60 to 135 g/m² (16 to 36 lb bond) grain long in the multipurpose feeder. Paper lighter than 60 g/m² (16 lb) might not be stiff enough to feed properly, causing jams. For best performance, use 90 g/m² (24 lb bond) grain long paper. To use paper narrower than 182 x 257 mm (7.2 x 10.1 in.), it is recommended that the weight be greater than or equal to 90 g/m² (24 lb bond).

Curl

Curl is the tendency of media to curve at its edges. Excessive curl can cause paper feeding problems. Curl can occur after the paper passes through the printer, where it is exposed to high temperatures. Storing paper unwrapped in hot, humid, cold and dry conditions, even in the trays, can contribute to paper curling prior to printing and can cause feeding problems.

Smoothness

The degree of smoothness of paper directly affects print quality. If the paper is too rough, the toner does not fuse to the paper properly, resulting in poor print quality. If the paper is too smooth, it can cause paper feeding or print quality issues. Smoothness needs to be between 100 and 300 Sheffield points; however, smoothness between 150 and 250 Sheffield points produces the best print quality.

Moisture content

The amount of moisture in the paper affects both print quality and the ability of the printer to feed the paper properly. Leave the paper in its original wrapper until it is time to use it. This limits the exposure of the paper to moisture changes that can degrade its performance.

Condition paper while it is still in the original wrapper. To condition it, store it in the same environment as the printer for 24 to 48 hours before printing to let the paper stabilize in the new conditions. Extend the time several days if the storage or transportation environment is very different from the printer environment. Thick paper may also require a longer conditioning period because of the mass of material.

Grain direction

Grain refers to the alignment of the paper fibers in a sheet of paper. Grain is either *grain long*, running the length of the paper, or *grain short*, running the width of the paper.

For 60 to 90 g/m² (16 to 24 lb bond) paper, grain long fibers are recommended.

Fiber content

Most high-quality xerographic paper is made from 100% chemically pulped wood. This content provides the paper with a high degree of stability resulting in fewer paper feeding problems and better print quality. Paper containing fibers such as cotton possess characteristics that can result in degraded paper handling.

Unacceptable paper

The following papers are not recommended for use with the printer:

- Chemically treated papers used to make copies without carbon paper, also known as carbonless papers, carbonless copy paper (CCP), or no carbon required (NCR) paper
- Preprinted papers with chemicals that may contaminate the printer
- Preprinted papers that can be affected by the temperature in the printer fuser
- Preprinted papers that require a *registration* (the precise print location on the page) greater than ±0.09 in., such as optical character recognition (OCR) forms

In some cases, you can adjust registration with your software application to successfully print on these forms.

- Coated papers (erasable bond), synthetic papers, thermal papers
- Rough-edged, rough or heavily textured surface papers or curled papers
- Recycled papers containing more than 25% post-consumer waste that do not meet DIN 19 309
- Recycled paper having a weight less than 60 g/m² (16 lb)
- Multiple-part forms or documents

Selecting paper

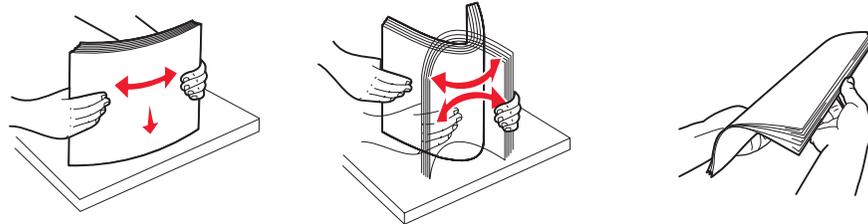
Proper paper loading helps prevent jams and ensures trouble-free printing.

To help avoid jams or poor print quality:

- *Always* use new, undamaged paper.
- Before loading paper, know the recommended print side of the paper. This information is usually indicated on the paper package.

Understanding paper and specialty media guidelines

- Do not use paper that has been cut or trimmed by hand.
- Do not mix media sizes, weights, or types in the same source; mixing results in jams.
- Do not use coated papers unless they are specifically designed for electrophotographic printing.
- Do not forget to change the Paper Size setting when using a source that does not support auto size sensing.
- Do not remove trays while a job is printing or **Busy** appears on the operator panel.
- Make sure the Paper Type, Paper Texture, and Paper Weight settings are correct. (See “Paper Menu” in the *Menus and Messages Guide* located on the publications CD for detailed information about these settings.)
- Make sure the paper is properly loaded in the source.
- Flex paper back and forth. Do not fold or crease the paper. Straighten the edges on a level surface.



Selecting preprinted forms and letterhead

Use the following guidelines when selecting preprinted forms and letterhead paper for the printer:

- Use grain long papers for best results for 60 to 90 g/m² weights.
- Use only forms and letterhead printed using an offset lithographic or engraved printing process.
- Avoid papers with rough or heavily textured surfaces.

Use papers printed with heat-resistant inks designed for use in xerographic copiers. The ink must withstand temperatures of 230°C (446°F) without melting or releasing hazardous emissions. Use inks that are not affected by the resin in toner. Inks that are oxidation-set or oil-based should meet these requirements; latex inks might not. When in doubt, contact the paper supplier.

Preprinted papers such as letterhead must be able to withstand temperatures up to 230°C (446°F) without melting or releasing hazardous emissions.

Printing on letterhead

Check with the manufacturer or vendor to determine whether the chosen preprinted letterhead is acceptable for laser printers.

Page orientation is important when printing on letterhead. Use the following table for help when loading letterhead in the media sources.

Transparencies

Feed transparencies from the standard tray or the multipurpose feeder. Try a sample of any transparencies being considered for use with the printer before buying large quantities.

When printing on transparencies:

- Be sure to set the Paper Type to Transparency from the printer driver or from MarkVision™ Professional to avoid damaging the printer.
- Use transparencies designed specifically for laser printers. Transparencies must be able to withstand temperatures of 230°C (446°F) without melting, discoloring, offsetting or releasing hazardous emissions.
- To prevent print quality problems, avoid getting fingerprints on the transparencies.
- Before loading transparencies, fan the stack to prevent sheets from sticking together.

Selecting transparencies

The printer can print directly on transparencies designed for use in laser printers. Print quality and durability depend on the transparency used. Always print samples on the transparencies being considered for use before buying large quantities.

We recommend Lexmark part number 70X7240 letter size transparency and Lexmark part number 12A5010 for A4 size transparency.

The Paper Type setting should be set to Transparency to help prevent jams. (See “Paper Type” on the publications CD for detailed information about this setting.) Check with the manufacturer or vendor to determine whether the transparencies are compatible with laser printers that heat transparencies to 230°C (446°F). Use only transparencies that are able to withstand these temperatures without melting, discoloring, offsetting, or releasing hazardous emissions. For detailed information, see the *Card Stock & Label Guide*, which is available on the Lexmark Web site at www.lexmark.com/publications.

Transparencies can be fed automatically from the multipurpose feeder and the standard 500-sheet trays (Tray 1 and Tray 2). See **Print media types on page 39** for information about transparency compatibility with output bins.

Be careful when you handle transparencies. Fingerprints on the surface of the transparency cause poor print quality.

Envelopes

You can load up to 10 envelopes in the multipurpose feeder. Try a sample of any envelopes you are considering using with the printer before buying large quantities. See **Loading the multipurpose feeder on page 52** for instructions on loading envelopes.

When printing on envelopes:

- To achieve the best possible print quality, use only high-quality envelopes that are designed for use in laser printers.
- Set the Paper Source in the Paper menu based on the source in use, set the Paper Type to Envelope, and select the correct envelope size from the operator panel, the printer driver, or from MarkVision Professional.
- For best performance, use envelopes made from 90 g/m² (24 lb bond) paper. Use up to 105 g/m² (28 lb bond) weight for the 500-sheet standard trays and multipurpose feeder as long as the cotton content is 25% or less. Envelopes with 100% cotton content must not exceed 90 g/m² (24 lb bond) weight.
- Use only new, undamaged envelopes.
- For best performance and to minimize jams, do not use envelopes that:
 - Have excessive curl or twist.
 - Are stuck together or damaged in any way.
 - Contain windows, holes, perforations, cutouts or embossing.
 - Use metal clasps, string ties, or metal folding bars.
 - Have an interlocking design.
 - Have postage stamps attached.
 - Have any exposed adhesive when the flap is in the sealed or closed position.
 - Have nicked edges or bent corners.

Understanding paper and specialty media guidelines

- Have rough, cockle, or laid finishes.
- Use envelopes that can withstand temperatures of 230°C (446°F) without sealing, excessive curling, wrinkling, or releasing hazardous emissions. If you have any doubts about the envelopes you are considering using, check with the envelope supplier.
- Adjust the width guide to fit the width of the envelopes.
- Load only one size of envelope at a time.
- A combination of high humidity (over 60%) and the high printing temperatures may seal the envelopes.

Labels

The printer can print on many labels designed for use with laser printers, except for vinyl labels. These labels are supplied in letter size, A4 size, and legal size sheets. Label adhesives, face sheet (printable stock), and topcoats must be able to withstand temperatures of 230°C (446°F) and pressure of 25 pounds per square inch (psi).

Try a sample of any labels you are considering using with the printer before purchasing a large quantity.

For detailed information on label printing, characteristics, and design, see the *Card Stock & Label Guide* available on the Lexmark Web site at www.lexmark.com/publications.

After printing approximately 10,000 pages of labels (or each time you replace the toner cartridge), complete the following steps to maintain printer feeding reliability:

- 1 Print five sheets of paper.
- 2 Wait approximately five seconds.
- 3 Print five more sheets of paper.

When printing on labels:

- Set the Paper Type menu item to Labels in the Paper menu. Set the Paper Type from the printer operator panel, the printer driver, or from MarkVision Professional.
- Do not load labels together with paper or transparencies in the same source; mixing media can cause feeding problems.
- Do not use label sheets with a slick backing material.
- Use full label sheets. Partial sheets may cause labels to peel off during printing, resulting in a jam. Partial sheets also contaminate the printer and the cartridge with adhesive, and could void the printer and cartridge warranties.
- Use labels that can withstand temperatures of 230°C (446°F) without sealing, excessive curling, wrinkling, or releasing hazardous emissions.
- Do not print within 1 mm (0.04 in.) of the edge of the label, of the perforations, or between die-cuts of the label.
- Do not use label sheets that have adhesive to the edge of the sheet. Zone coating of the adhesive at least 1 mm (0.04 in.) away from edges is recommended. Adhesive material contaminates the printer and could void the warranty.
- If zone coating of the adhesive is not possible, remove a 3 mm (0.125 in.) strip on the leading and driver edge, and use a non-oozing adhesive.
- Remove a 3 mm (0.125 in.) strip from the leading edge to prevent labels from peeling inside the printer.
- Portrait orientation is preferred, especially when printing bar codes.
- Do not use labels that have exposed adhesive.

For detailed information on label printing, characteristics, and design, see the *Card Stock & Label Guide*, available on the Lexmark Web site at www.lexmark.com/publications.

Card stock

Card stock is single ply, and has a large array of properties, such as the moisture content, thickness, and texture, that can significantly affect print quality. See **Supported print media on page 35** for information on the preferred weight and for the grain direction of print media.

Try a sample of any card stock you are considering using with the printer before purchasing a large quantity.

See **Print media weights on page 40** for information on the preferred weight of media.

When printing on card stock:

- Set the Paper Type menu item in the Paper Menu to Card Stock from the operator panel, from the printer driver, or from MarkVision Professional. Set the Paper Weight to CardStock Weight, and select the CardStock Weight as Normal or Heavy for the value. Set this from the operator panel, the printer driver, or from MarkVision Professional. Use Heavy for card stock weighing more than or heavier than 163 g/m² (90 lb).
- Be aware that preprinting, perforation, and creasing can significantly affect the print quality and cause media handling or jamming problems.
- Avoid using card stock that may release hazardous emissions when heated.
- Do not use preprinted card stock manufactured with chemicals that may contaminate the printer. Preprinting introduces semi-liquid and volatile components into the printer.
- The use of grain long card stock is recommended.

Storing print media

Use the following guidelines to avoid paper feeding problems and uneven print quality.

- For best results, store media in an environment where the temperature is approximately 21°C (70°F) and the relative humidity is 40%.
Most label manufacturers recommend printing in a temperature range of 18 to 24°C (65 to 75°F) with a relative humidity of 40 to 60%.
- Store cartons of media on a pallet or shelf, rather than directly on the floor.
- When storing individual packages of media out of the original carton, make sure they rest on a flat surface so the edges do not buckle or curl.
- Do not place anything on top of the media packages.
- Store paper in its original wrapper until you load it into the printer.

Avoiding jams

Use appropriate print media (paper, transparencies, labels, and card stock) to help ensure trouble-free printing. See **Supported print media on page 35** for more information.

Note: Try a limited sample of any print media you are considering using with the printer before purchasing large quantities.

By selecting the appropriate print media and loading it properly, you can avoid most jams. For detailed tray loading instructions, see the following:

Understanding paper and specialty media guidelines

The following hints can help you avoid jams:

- Use only recommended print media.
- Do not overload the print media sources. Make sure the stack height does not exceed the maximum height indicated by the stack line on the labels in the sources.
- Do not load wrinkled, creased, damp, or curled print media.
- Flex, fan, and straighten print media before you load it. If jams do occur with print media, try feeding one sheet at a time through the multipurpose feeder.
- Do not use print media that you have cut or trimmed yourself.
- Do not mix print media sizes, weights, or types in the same print media source.
- Make sure the recommended print side is loaded in the source according to your simplex or duplex needs.
- Keep print media stored in an acceptable environment. See **Storing print media on page 47**.
- Do not remove trays during a print job.
- Push all trays in firmly after loading them.
- Make sure the guides in the trays are properly positioned for the size of print media you have loaded. Make sure the guides are not placed too tightly against the stack of print media.

Loading standard or optional 500-sheet trays

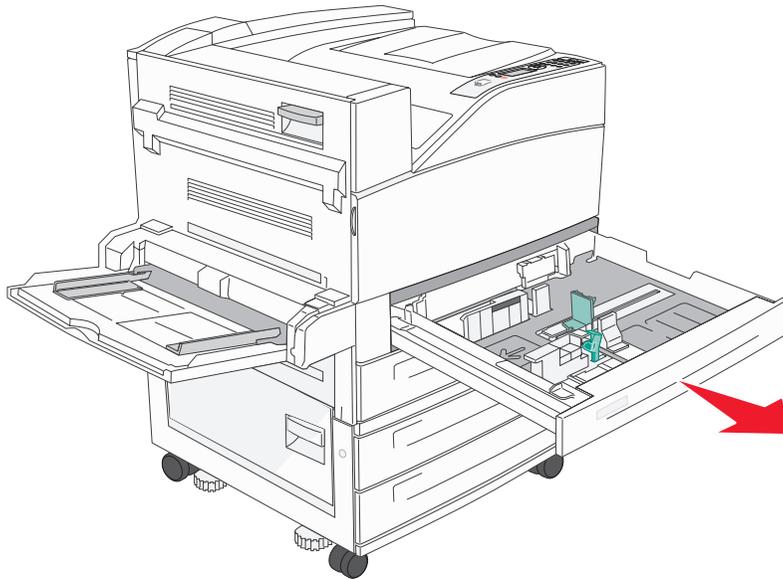
Your printer has two 500-sheet standard trays. You may have also purchased an optional 2x500-sheet drawer which has two additional 500-sheet trays. Print media is loaded into all the 500-sheet trays the same way.

Note: The steps for loading the optional 2000-sheet dual input trays and the 2000-sheet high capacity feeder are different than the steps for loading a 500-sheet tray.

To load print media:

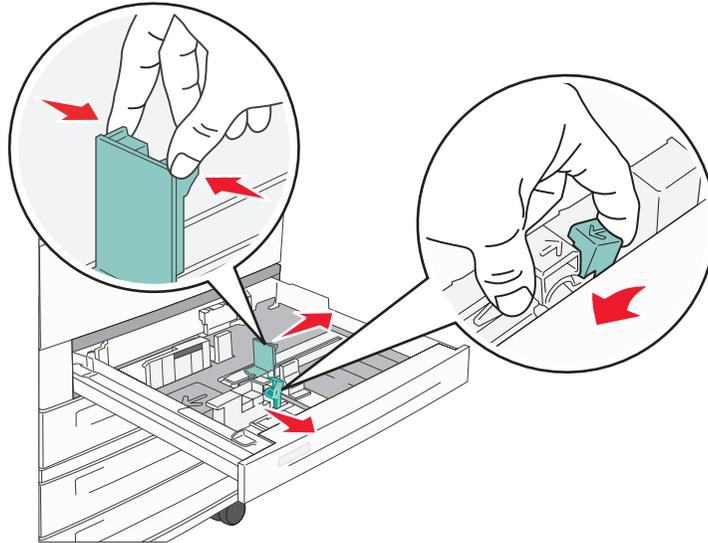
Note: Do not remove a tray when a job is printing or when the operator panel indicator light is blinking. Doing so may cause a jam.

- 1 Pull out the tray.

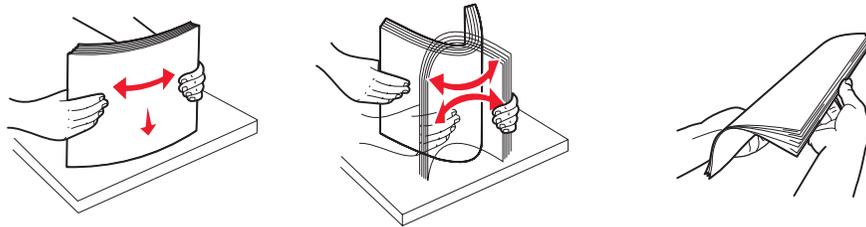

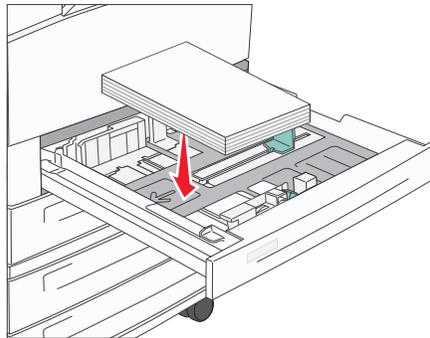
- 2 Squeeze the side guide tab, and slide the guide to outside of the tray.



- 3 Squeeze the front guide tab and slide the guide to the correct position for the size media you are loading.

- 5 Load print media in the tray with the print side up.

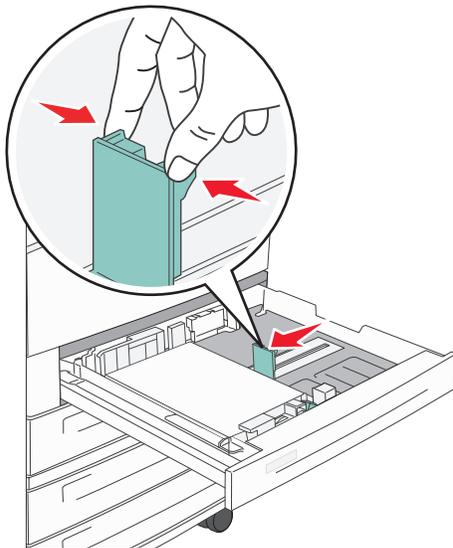

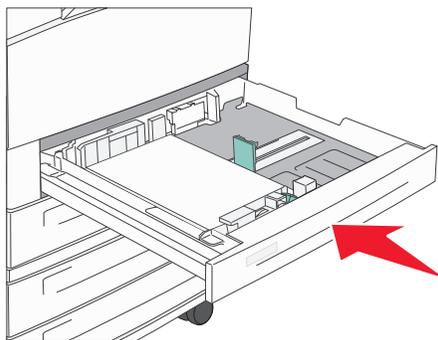

Loading the multipurpose feeder

The multipurpose feeder can hold several sizes and types of print media, such as transparencies, postcards, note cards, and envelopes. It can be used for single-page or manual printing or as an additional tray.

The multipurpose feeder can hold approximately:

- 100 sheets of 75 g/m² (20 lb) paper
- 10 envelopes
- 75 transparencies

The multipurpose feeder accepts print media within the following dimensions:

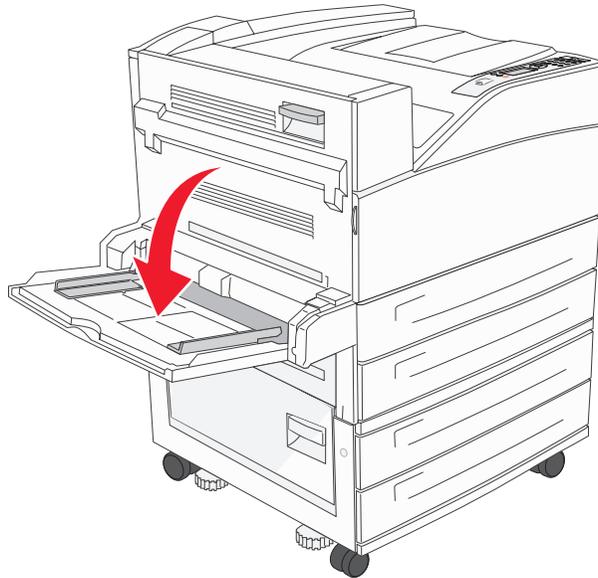
- Width—89 mm (3.5 in.) to 297 mm (11.7 in.)
- Length—98 mm (3.9 in.) to 432 mm (17.0 in.)

The icons on the multipurpose feeder show you how to load the multipurpose feeder with paper, how to turn an envelope for printing, and how to load letterhead paper for simplex and duplex printing.

To load print media:

Note: Do not add or remove print media when the printer is printing from the multipurpose feeder or when the operator panel indicator light is blinking. Doing so may cause a jam.

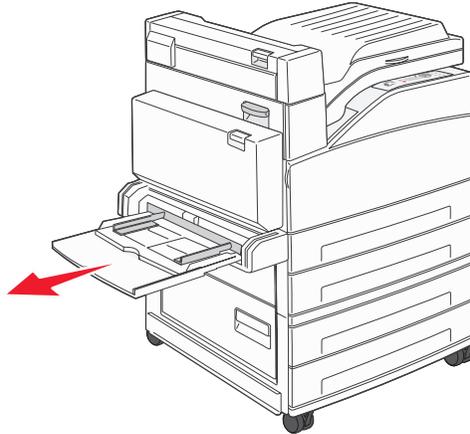
- 1 Lower the multipurpose feeder.



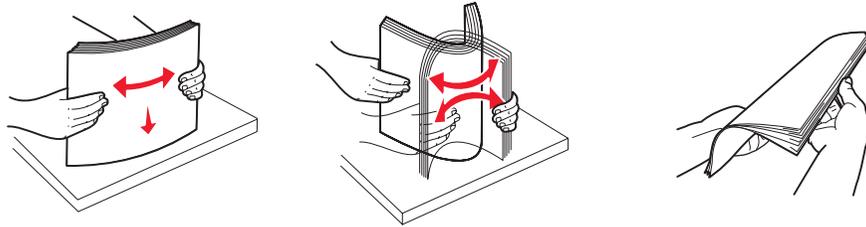

- 2 Pull the tray extension out.

Note: Do not place objects on the multipurpose feeder. Also, avoid pressing down or applying excessive force on it.

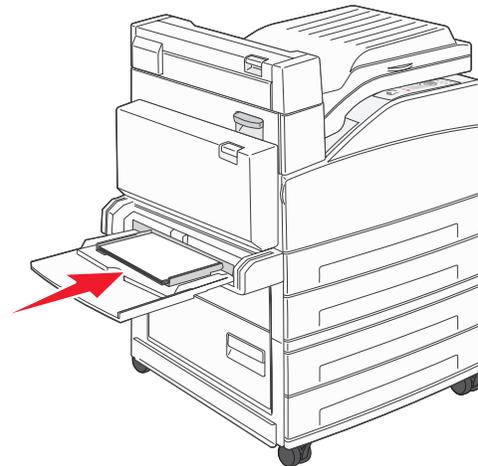


- 3 Slide the width guides to the outside of the feeder.
- 4 Flex the sheets or envelopes back and forth to loosen them, then fan them. Do not fold or crease the print media. Straighten the edges on a level surface.



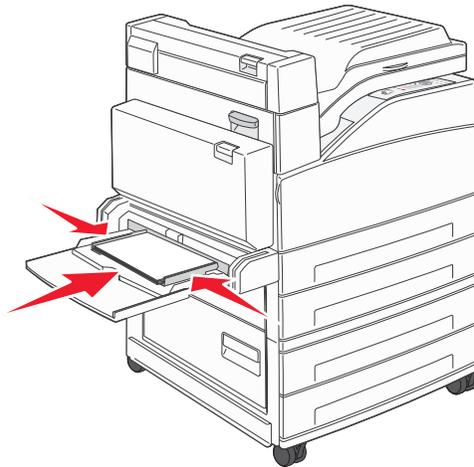
- 5 Load the media in the feeder.

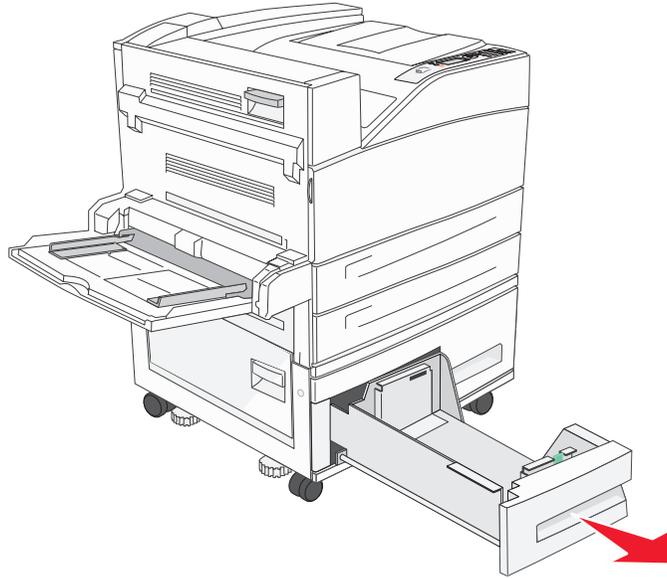

 - g Press  repeatedly to return to the **Ready** state.

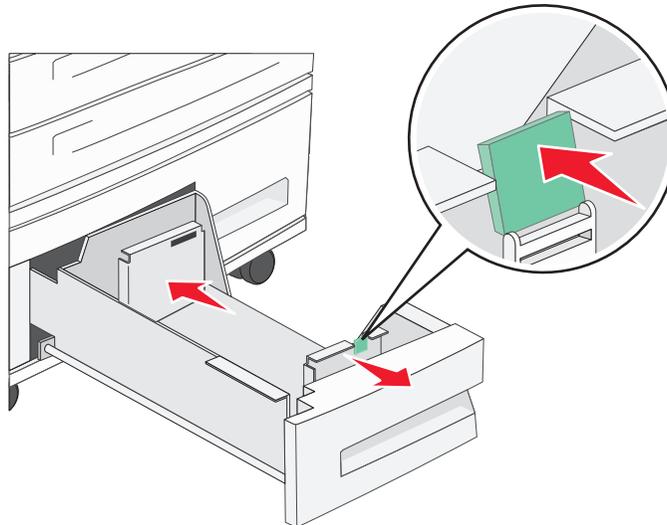
Loading the 2000-sheet dual input trays

The 2000-sheet dual input drawer includes two trays: an 850-sheet tray and an 1150-sheet tray. Although the trays are different in appearance, they both load the same way.

- 1 Pull out the tray.

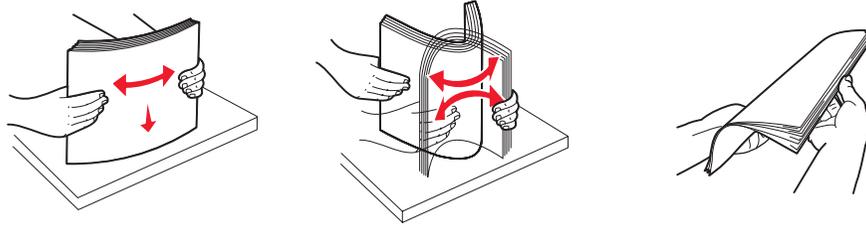


- 2 Squeeze the front guide tab, and slide the guide to the correct position for the size media you are loading.

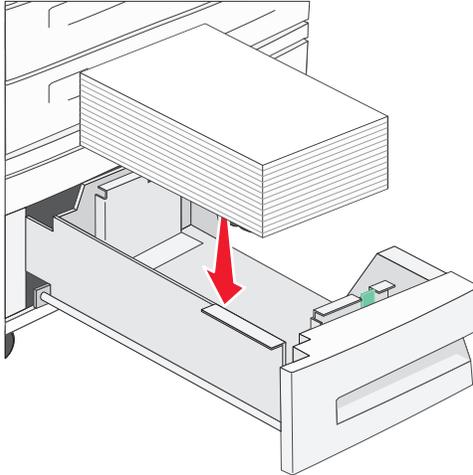

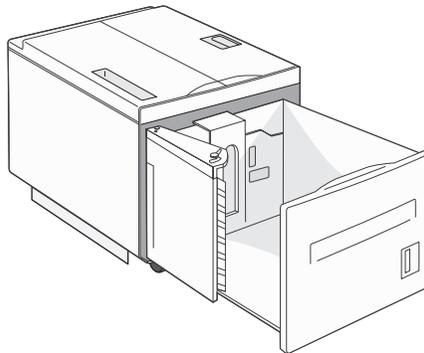

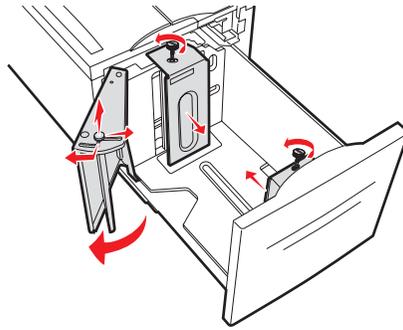
The high capacity feeder can hold 2000 sheets of Letter, A4, Executive, and JIS B5 paper (75 g/m² [20 lb]).

- 1 Pull out the tray.

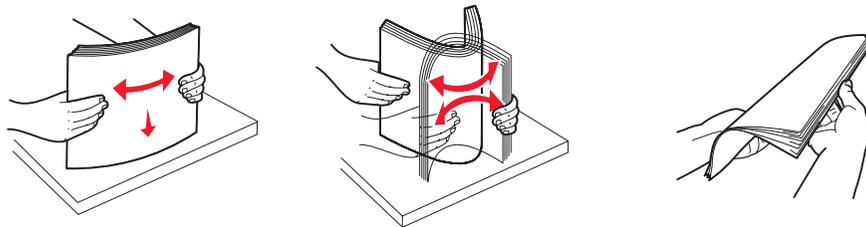

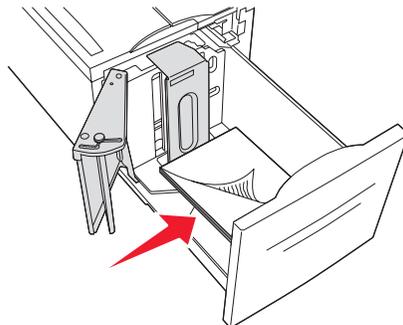
- 2 If loading print media with a different width or length, adjust the width and length guides.



- 3 Flex the sheets back and forth to loosen them, then fan them. Do not fold or crease the print media. Straighten the edges on a level surface.



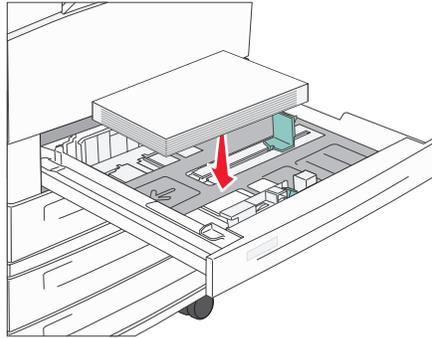
- 4 Load print media in the tray with the print side down.



- Place pre-punched paper with the holes toward the left side of the tray.
- Place letterhead (or the top of the page) toward the front of the tray.

- 5 Insert the tray into the high capacity feeder.

Loading Letter or A4 size print media in the short-edge feed orientation



In order for the printer to recognize letter or A4 size print media loaded in the short-edge feed orientation, Short-edge Printing must be enabled.

- 1 Make sure the printer is off.
- 2 Press and hold the  and  buttons while you turn the printer on.
- 3 Release both buttons when **Performing Self Test** appears on the display.
The printer performs its power-on sequence, and then **Config Menu** appears on the first line of the display.
- 4 Press  until  **Short-edge Printing** appears, and then press .
Disabled appears on the second line of the display.
- 5 Press  or  to change the setting to **Enabled**, and then press .
Submitting Selection appears briefly on the display, and then is replaced by **Config Menu** on the first line and **Short-edge Printing** on the second line.
- 6 Press and release  or  until  **Exit Config Menu** appears, and then press .
Activating Menu Changes appears briefly, followed by **Performing Self Test**. The printer returns to **Ready**.

Setting up trays with different orientations

We recommend that you use the custom type settings to differentiate print media of the same size with different orientations. For example, if you want to have letter-size paper loaded into both standard trays, but one in the long-edge orientation and one in the short-edge orientation, you could set up the trays as follows:

- **Tray 1:** Long-edge Fed; Paper Size=Letter; Paper Type=Plain
- **Tray 2:** Short-edge Fed; Paper Size=Letter; Paper Type=Custom Type 1

By setting the printer menus like this, you can easily choose which orientation you want to use for a print job by selecting the appropriate tray.

Changing the Custom Type Name

You can use the printer Embedded Web Server or MarkVision to define a name other than "Custom Type [x]" for each of the custom media types that are loaded. When a custom name is defined for a Custom Type, then the printer displays this name wherever it would normally display "Custom Type [x]".

To define a custom name using the Embedded Web Server:

- 1 Open the printer Embedded Web Server by typing its IP address in the address bar of a browser. For example:
`http://192.168.0.11`
- 2 Click **Configuration**.
- 3 Click **PAPER MENU**.
- 4 Click **CUSTOM NAMES**.
- 5 Define one or more custom names.
For example, you could enter names such as “Short-edge Letter” or “Yellow Glossy.”
- 6 Click **Submit**.

Linking trays

Tray linking enables the automatic linking feature for trays when you load the same size and type of print media in multiple sources. The printer automatically links the trays; when one tray is empty, print media feeds from the next linked tray.

For example, if you have the same size and type of print media loaded in tray 2 and tray 4, the printer selects print media from tray 2 until it becomes empty, and then the printer automatically feeds print media from the next linked tray—tray 4.

By linking all five trays, you effectively create a single source with a capacity of 4,000 sheets.

If you load the same size print media in each tray, make sure the print media is all the same type in order to link the trays.

To set the paper type or size:

- 1 Press  on the operator panel.
- 2 Press  until  **Paper Menu** appears, and then press .
- 3 Press  until  **Paper Size/Type** appears, and then press .
- 4 Press  until  **Tray <x> Size/Type** appears, and then press .
- 5 Press  until the  appears next to the media size you loaded, and then press .
- 6 Press  until the media type you loaded appears, and then press .
- 7 Press  repeatedly to return to the **Ready** state.

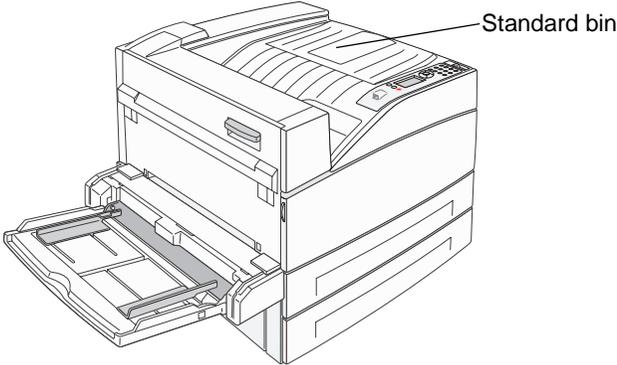
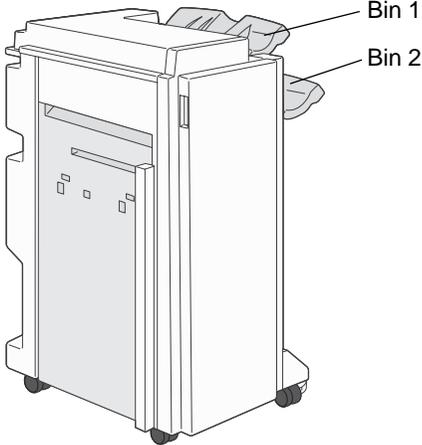
Once the trays you selected are loaded with the same size and type of print media, select the same Paper Type setting in the Paper menu for these sources.

To disable tray linking, set the Paper Type to a unique value in each one of the trays. If all the trays do not have the same type of print media when they are linked, you could mistakenly print a job on the wrong paper type.

Identifying and linking output bins

There is one standard output bin on all printer models. If you need additional output capacity, the optional finisher provides up to 3500 sheets of additional output capacity.

The following table provides information on output bin capacities.

Output bin	Each bin accommodates	Illustration of output bin
Standard bin	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 500 sheets* (75 g/m² [20 lb]) plain paper • 300 transparencies • 200 labels • 50 envelopes (75 g/m² [20 lb]) 	
Finisher bin 1	500 sheets (75 g/m ² [20 lb]) plain paper	
Finisher bin 2	3000 sheets† (75 g/m ² [20 lb]) plain paper	

* Standard bin capacity with finisher installed: up to 300 sheets.
† This capacity may decrease if mixed print media sizes are sent to this bin.

Linking output bins

If you have multiple output bins, linking them lets you create a single output source so the printer can automatically switch output to the next available bin. For more information on the values available to configure your output bins, see the *Menus and Messages Guide*.

Note: The bin sequence for linking always starts with the standard bin and proceeds from the bin nearest to the floor to the bin farthest from the floor.

To link output bins:

- 1 Press  on the operator panel.
- 2 Press  until  **Paper Menu** appears, and then press .

- 3 Press ▼ until ✓ **Bin Setup** appears, and then press ✓.
- 4 Press ▼ until ✓ **Configure Bins** appears, and then press ✓.
- 5 Press ▼ until ✓ **Link** appears, and then press ✓.
- 6 Press ⏪ repeatedly to return to the **Ready** state.

Sending a job to print

A printer driver is software that lets your computer communicate with your printer. When you choose **Print** from a software application, a window representing the printer driver opens. You can then select the appropriate settings for the specific job you are sending to the printer. Print settings selected from the driver override the default settings selected from the printer operator panel.

You may need to click **Properties** or **Setup** from the initial Print box to see all of the available printer settings you can change. If you are not familiar with a feature in the printer driver window, open the online Help for more information.

To support all the printer features, use the Lexmark custom printer drivers supplied with your printer. Updated drivers, as well as a complete description of the driver packages and Lexmark driver support, are available from the Lexmark Web site. You can also use the system drivers built into your operating system.

To print a job from a typical Windows application:

- 1 Open the file you want to print.
- 2 From the "File" menu, select **Print**.
- 3 Select the correct printer in the dialog. Modify the printer settings as appropriate (such as the pages you want to print or the number of copies).
- 4 Click **Properties** or **Setup** to adjust printer settings that were not available on the first screen, and then click **OK**.
- 5 Click **OK** or **Print** to send the job to the selected printer.

Printing from a USB flash memory device

A USB Direct interface is located on the operator panel so you can insert a USB flash memory device and print PDF documents. Printing a document from a USB flash memory device is similar to printing a held job.

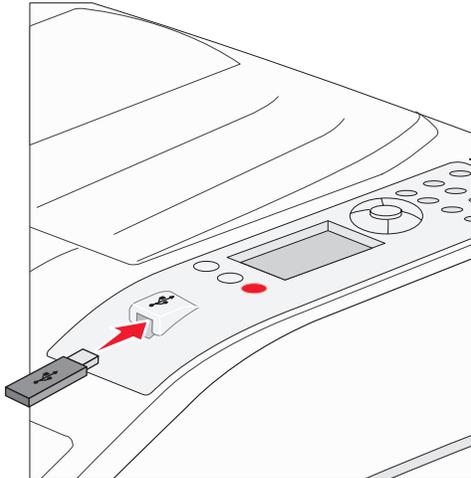

Note the following when using a USB flash memory device with the printer USB Direct Interface:

- USB devices must be compatible with the USB 2.0 standard.
- Hi-Speed USB devices must support the Full-Speed standard as well. Devices only supporting USB low speed capabilities are not supported.
- USB devices must use the FAT file system. Devices formatted with NTFS or any other file system are not supported.
- You cannot print encrypted files or files without printing permissions.

To print from a USB flash memory device:

- 1 Make sure the printer is on and **Ready** or **Busy** appears.
- 2 Insert a USB flash memory device into the USB Direct interface.

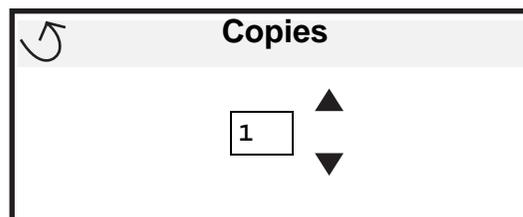
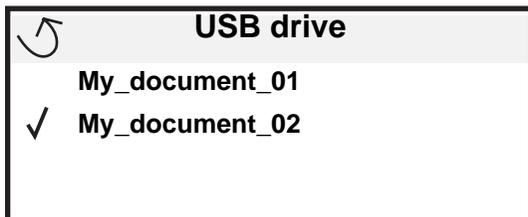


Note:

- If you insert the memory device when the printer requires attention such as when a paper jam has occurred, the printer ignores the memory device.
- If you insert the memory device when the printer is busy printing other jobs, the message **Printer Busy** appears. Select **Continue**, and your job prints after the other jobs finish.

- 3 Press ▼ until the ✓ appears next to the document you want to print, and then press ⓧ.

A screen asking the number of copies to be printed will appear.



- 4 To print only one copy, press ⓧ, or manually input the number of copies with the number pad, then press ⓧ.

Note: Do not remove the USB flash memory device from the USB Direct interface until the document has finished printing.

The document will begin printing.

If you leave the device in the printer after exiting the USB drive menu, you can still print PDFs on the device as held jobs. See **Printing confidential and held jobs on page 65**.

Canceling a job from a Macintosh computer running Mac OS X

- 1 Open **Applications** → **Utilities**, and then double-click **Print Center** or **Printer Setup**.
- 2 Double-click the printer you are printing to.
- 3 In the printer window, select the print job you want to cancel.
- 4 Press **Delete**.

Printing the menu settings page

You can print a menu settings page to review the default printer settings and to verify printer options are installed correctly.

- 1 Make sure the printer is on and **Ready**.
- 2 Press  on the operator panel.
- 3 Press  until  **Reports** appears, and then press .
- 4 Press  until  **Menu Settings Page** appears, and then press .

Printing Menus Settings appears on the display.

The printer returns to the **Ready** state after the menu settings page prints.

Printing a network setup page

You can print a network settings page to review the default printer settings and to verify printer options are installed correctly. Go to **Printing a network setup page on page 17**.

Printing a font sample list

To print samples of the fonts currently available for your printer:

- 1 Make sure the printer is on and the **Ready** message appears.
- 2 Press  on the operator panel.
- 3 Press  until  **Reports** appears, and then press .
- 4 Press  until  **Print Fonts** appears, and then press .
- 5 Press  until the  appears next to **PCL Emul Fonts**, **PostScript Fonts**, or **PPDS Fonts**, and then press .

Printing a directory list

A directory listing shows the resources stored in flash memory or on the hard disk. To print a listing:

- 1 Make sure the printer is on and the **Ready** message appears.
 - 2 Press  on the operator panel.
 - 3 Press  until  **Reports** appears, and then press .
 - 4 Press  until  **Print Directory** appears, and then press .
- The message **Printing Directory List** appears on the display.
- The printer returns to the Ready state after the directory list prints.

Printing confidential and held jobs

The term *held job* refers to any type of print job that can be initiated by the user at the printer. This includes a confidential job, a verify print job, a reserve print job, a repeat print job, a bookmark, a profile, or a file on a USB flash memory device.

When sending a job to the printer, you can specify in the driver that you want the printer to hold the job in memory. Once your job is stored in printer memory, go to the printer and use the printer operator panel to specify what you want to do with your print job.

All confidential and held jobs have a user name associated with them. To access confidential or held jobs, you must first select the type of job (confidential or held), and then select your user name from the user name list. Once you select your user name, you can print all your confidential jobs or select an individual print job. You can then choose the number of copies for the print job or you can delete the print job.

Printing a confidential job

When you send a confidential job to the printer, you must enter a personal identification number (PIN) from the driver. The PIN must be four digits using the numbers 0–9. The job is held in printer memory until you enter the same four-digit PIN from the operator panel and choose to print or delete the job. This ensures the job does not print until you are there to retrieve it. No one else using the printer can print the job without the PIN.

Windows

- 1 From a word processor, spreadsheet, browser, or other application, select **File** → **Print**.
- 2 Click **Properties**. (If there is no Properties button, click **Setup**, and then click **Properties**.)
- 3 Depending on the operating system, you may have to click the **Other Options** tab, and then click **Print and Hold**.

Note: If you have difficulty finding Print and Hold → Confidential Print, click **Help** and see the topic Confidential Print or Print and Hold, and then follow the driver instructions.

- 4 Enter a User Name and PIN.
- 5 Send your job to the printer.

Go to the printer when you are ready to retrieve your confidential print job, and follow the **At the printer** steps on page 66.

Macintosh

- 1 From a word processor, spreadsheet, browser, or other application, select **File** → **Print**.
- 2 In the “Copies & Pages” or “General” pop-up menu, select **Job Routing**.
 - a When using Mac OS 9, if Job Routing is not a choice on the pop-up menu, select **Plug-in Preferences** → **Print Time Filters**.
 - b Turn down the disclosure triangle to the left of **Print Time Filters**, and select **Job Routing**.
 - c In the pop-up menu, select **Job Routing**.

- 3 In the radio group, select **Confidential Print**.

- 4 Enter a User Name and PIN.

- 5 Send your job to the printer.

Go to the printer when you are ready to retrieve your confidential print job, and follow the **At the printer** steps on page 66.

At the printer

- 1 Press ▼ until ✓ **Held jobs** appears, and then press ✓.
- 2 Press ▼ until ✓ **Confidential jobs** appears, and then press ✓.
- 3 Press ▼ until the ✓ appears next to your user name, and then press ✓.
- 4 Enter your PIN.

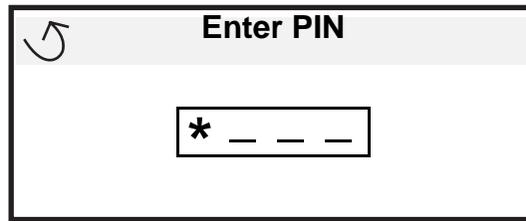

- 5 Press ▼ until the ✓ appears next to the job you want to print, and then press ✓.

Note: After your job prints, it is deleted from printer memory.

Entering a personal identification number (PIN)

When you select **Confidential Job** from the **Held job** menu, the following prompt appears on the display after you select your user name:



- 1 Use the numeric pad to enter the four-digit PIN associated with your confidential job.

Note: As you enter the PIN, asterisks appear on the display to ensure confidentiality.

If you enter an invalid PIN, the Invalid PIN screen appears.

- To reenter the PIN, make sure **✓ Try again** appears, and then press **✓**.
- To cancel, press **▼** until **✓ Cancel** appears, and then press **✓**.

- 2 Press **▼** until the **✓** appears next to the job you want to print, and then press **✓**.

Note: After your job prints, it is deleted from printer memory.

Printing and deleting held jobs

Held jobs such as Verify Print, Reserve Print, Repeat Print, Bookmarks, and USB flash memory files differ in function and do not require a PIN to print the job. These jobs are printed or deleted from the printer operator panel.

Verify Print

If you send a Verify Print job, the printer prints one copy and holds the remaining copies you requested in printer memory. Use Verify Print to examine the first copy to see if it is satisfactory before printing the remaining copies. Once all copies are printed, the Verify Print job is automatically deleted from printer memory.

Reserve Print

If you send a Reserve Print job, the printer does not print the job immediately. It stores the job in memory so you can print the job later. The job is held in memory until you delete it from the Held Jobs menu. Reserve Print jobs may be deleted if the printer requires extra memory to process additional held jobs.

Repeat Print

If you send a Repeat Print job, the printer prints all requested copies of the job *and* stores the job in memory so you can print additional copies later. You can print additional copies as long as the job remains stored in memory.

Note: Repeat Print jobs are automatically deleted from printer memory when the printer requires extra memory to process additional held jobs.

Windows

- 1 From a word processor, spreadsheet, browser, or other application, select **File → Print**.
- 2 Click **Properties**. (If there is no Properties button, click **Setup**, and then click **Properties**.)

Printing

- 3 Depending on the operating system, you may have to click the **Other Options** tab, and then click **Print and Hold**.

Note: If you have difficulty finding Print and Hold → Held Jobs, click **Help**, and see the topic Held Jobs or Print and Hold, then follow the driver instructions.

- 4 Select the type of held job you want, and then send your job to the printer.

Go to the printer when you are ready to retrieve your confidential print job, and follow the **At the printer** steps on **page 68**.

Macintosh

The job will print or be deleted according to the type of print job and action you selected.

Printing A5/Statement or JIS-B5/Executive sizes

When Auto Size Sensing is set to On, the printer cannot distinguish between Statement and A5 or Executive and JIS-B5. Follow these directions to change the Size Sensing setting.

Note: This is not necessary when printing from the multipurpose feeder.

- 1 Make sure the printer is off.
- 2 Press and hold the  and  buttons while you turn the printer on.
- 3 Release both buttons when **Performing Self Test** appears on the display.
The printer performs its power-on sequence, and then **Config Menu** appears on the first line of the display.
- 4 Press  until  **size sensing** appears, and then press .
Tray 1 Sensing appears on the second line of the display.
- 5 Press and release  or  to select the input option that has A5/Statement or JIS-B5/Executive loaded, and then press .
The first line of the display shows the selected input option, and the second line shows the current setting.
- 6 Press  or  to change the setting to **Sense A5/Sense Statement** or **Sense JIS-B5/Sense Executive**, and then press .
Submitting Selection appears briefly on the display, and then is replaced by **Config Menu** on the first line and **Size Sensing** on the second line.
- 7 Press and release  or  until  **Exit Config Menu** appears, and then press .
Activating Menu Changes appears briefly, followed by **Performing Self Test**. The printer returns to **Ready**.

Maintaining the printer

Periodically, you need to complete certain tasks to maintain optimum print quality. These tasks are covered in this chapter.

If several people are using the printer, you may want to designate a key operator to do the setup and maintenance of your printer. Refer printing problems and maintenance tasks to this key operator.

Storing supplies

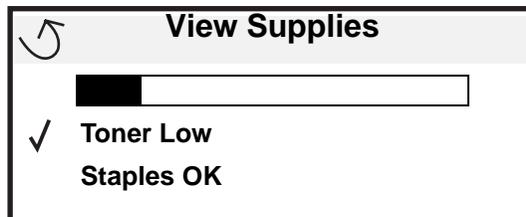
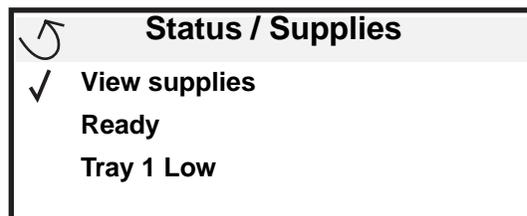
Choose a cool, clean storage area for your printer supplies. Store supplies right side up in their original packaging until you are ready to use them.

Do not expose supplies to:

- Direct sunlight
- Temperatures above 35°C (95°F)
- High humidity (above 80%)
- Salty air
- Corrosive gases
- Heavy dust

Determining the status of supplies

The printer operator panel alerts you once a supply item or maintenance is required. You can also view the status of supplies in your printer on the operator panel unless the printer is printing or in a busy state. The header or gray area at the top of the display will indicate the printer is **Ready** and lets you know if any trays are low. Selecting **status / supplies** on the display will open the **status / supplies** screen where you can view the status of the various trays and open the supplies screen to view the current status of your toner cartridge.



Photoconductor kit end-of-life

To ensure print quality and to avoid damage to the printer, the printer stops operating after the photoconductor kit has reached approximately 60,000 pages (Letter/A4). The message **84 Replace PC Unit** is displayed when the printer reaches this point. If the Toner Alarm setting is set to Single or Continuous (default is Off), the printer automatically notifies you before the photoconductor reaches this point and displays the message **84 PC Unit Life Warning**. To avoid having the printer stop operating, replace the photoconductor kit when you first receive the **84 PC Unit Life Warning** message. Once the photoconductor kit has been replaced, normal printer operation resumes.

Conserving supplies

Several settings in your application software or on the display let you conserve toner and paper. For more information on changing these settings, see the *Menus and Messages Guide*.

Supply	Menu selection item	What the setting does
Toner	Toner Darkness in the Defaults → Quality Menu	Lets you adjust the level of toner released on a sheet of print media. The values range from 1 (lightest setting) to 10 (darkest setting).
Print media	Multipage Print in the Defaults → Finishing Menu	Causes the printer to print the two or more page images on one side of a sheet. Values for Multipage Print are 2 Up, 3 Up, 4 Up, 6 Up, 9 Up, 12 Up, and 16 Up. Combined with the duplex setting, Multipage Print lets you print up to 32 pages on one sheet of paper (16 images on the front and 16 on the back).
	Duplex in the Defaults → Finishing Menu	Duplex printing is available when you attach the optional duplex unit. It lets you print on both sides of a sheet of paper.
	Use your software application or printer driver to send a Verify Print job.	Lets you examine the first copy of a multiple-copy job to be sure it is satisfactory before you print the other copies. If the job is unsatisfactory, you can cancel the job. See Printing and deleting held jobs on page 67 for more information about a Verify Print job.

Ordering a photoconductor kit

When the **84 PC Life Warning** message appears, you should order a new photoconductor kit. You can print a few hundred pages after the **84 PC Life Warning** message appears.

Order Lexmark part number W84030H.

Maintenance kit

80 **scheduled Maintenance** appears on the display after 300,000 pages have printed to let you know it is time to replace printer maintenance items. Order a maintenance kit when 80 **scheduled Maintenance** first appears on the display. The maintenance kit contains all the items necessary to replace the pick rollers, the fuser, and the transfer roller.

See the following table for the maintenance kit part number for your specific printer.

Ordering staple cartridges

Staple cartridges hold 3,000 staples. Use part number 25A0013 to order a pack of three staple cartridges.

When **Staples Low** or **Staples Empty** appears on the operator panel display, insert a new staple cartridge in the finisher. See the illustrations inside the stapler access door for more information.

- If Staple Alarm is set to Single, the printer stops printing and the **Load Staples** message appears. Install a new staple cartridge, or press **Go** to clear the message and continue printing.
- If Staple Alarm is set to Continuous, the printer displays the **Load Staples** message and continues printing. A partial sheet of staples will remain in the staple cartridge holder when this message appears. Do not remove this sheet. Install a new staple cartridge to properly feed the partial sheet of staples.

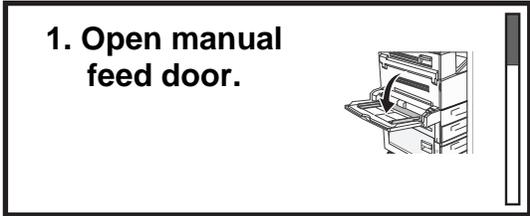
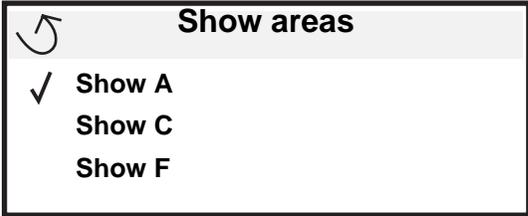
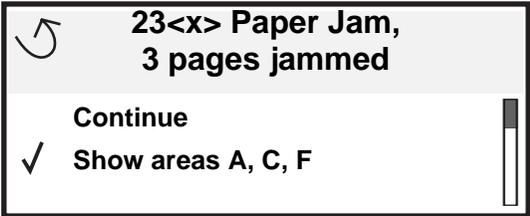
Clearing jams

By carefully selecting print media and loading it properly, you should be able to avoid most paper jams. For more information on avoiding paper jams, see **Avoiding jams on page 47**. If jams do occur, follow the steps outlined in this section.

To resolve the paper jam messages, you must clear the entire paper path and then press  to clear the message and resume printing. The printer prints a new copy of the page that jammed if Jam Recovery is set to On or Auto; however, the Auto setting does not guarantee the page will print.

Identifying jams

When the printer jams, the appropriate jam message appears on the printer operator panel. If you select **Show Areas** on the operator panel, you can view one or more images to help you clear the jam.



Access doors and trays

The following illustrations show the areas where jams may occur.



Understanding jam messages

The following table lists the jam messages that can occur and the action necessary to clear the message. The jam message indicates the area where the jam occurred. However, it is best to clear the entire paper path to ensure you have cleared all possible jams.

Message	What to do
200, 201, and 202 Paper Jam Check Door A	Open the side door, and remove the jam.
203 Paper Jam Check <Areas A/E>	Open the side door and the Exit 2 door, and remove the jam.
230 Paper Jam Check Door <A, E, D>	Lower the duplex unit, and remove the jam. Open the side door and the Exit 2 door, and remove the jam.
231 Paper Jam Check <A, D>	Lower the duplex unit, and remove the jam. Open the side door, and remove the jam.
24x Paper Jam Check Tray <x>	Open each tray, and remove any jammed media.
250 Paper Jam Check MP Feeder	Remove all media from the multipurpose feeder, flex and stack the media, reload the multipurpose feeder, and adjust the guide.
28x Paper Jam Check Finisher	Open the finisher door, bridge unit assembly, or output bin, then remove the jam.

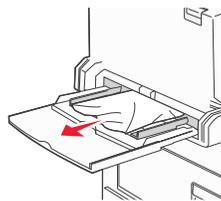
Clearing printer jams

Although there are several places a jam can occur, clearing the paper path is fairly easy depending on the jam message or messages displayed on the operator panel.

Note: The following clearing jam instructions may seem out of sequence. However, they have been grouped to help you quickly clear the print path.

250 Paper Jam Check MP Feeder

- 1 Remove the paper from the multipurpose feeder.

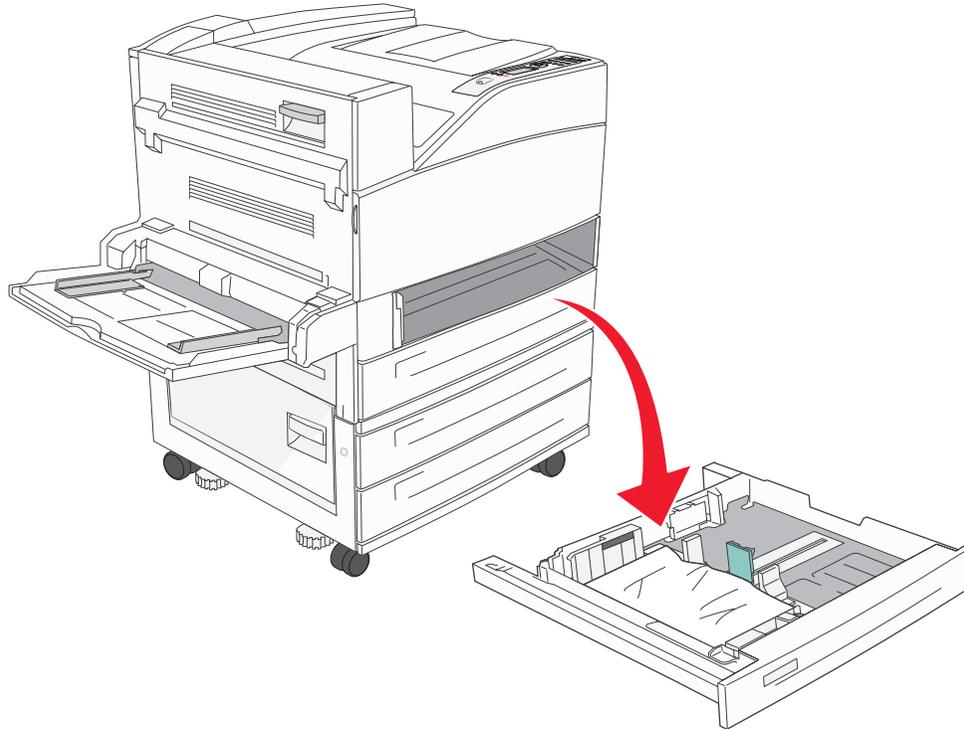


- 2 Flex, fan, and restack the media, and place it into the multipurpose feeder.
- 3 Load the print media.
- 4 Slide the side guide toward the inside of the tray until it lightly rests against the edge of the media.
- 5 Press .

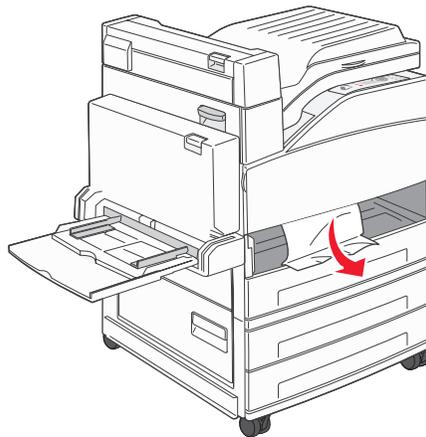
24x Paper Jam Check Tray <x>

Paper jams in these areas can occur on the incline surface of a tray or across more than one tray. To clear these areas:

- 1 Open the tray. If necessary, remove the tray from the printer.



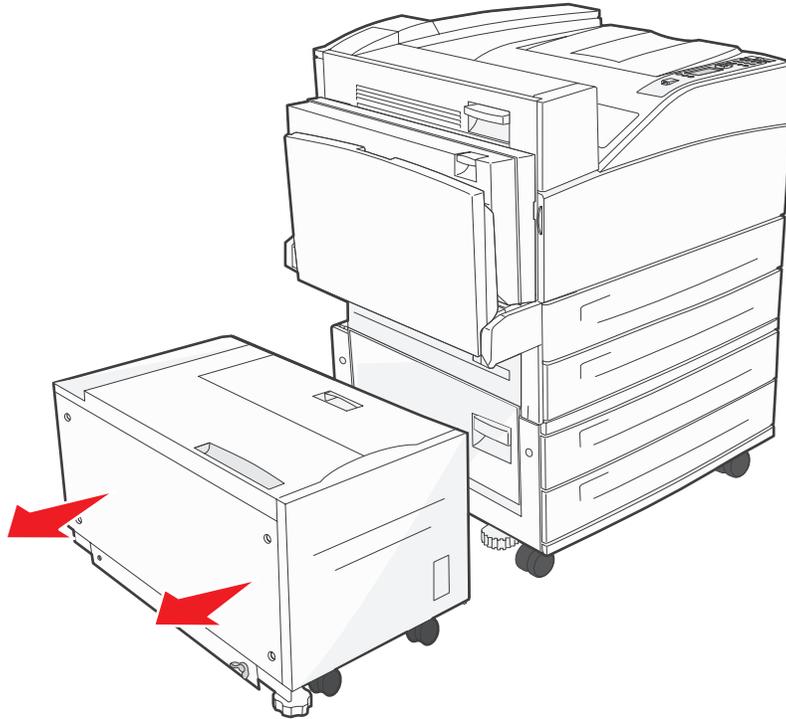

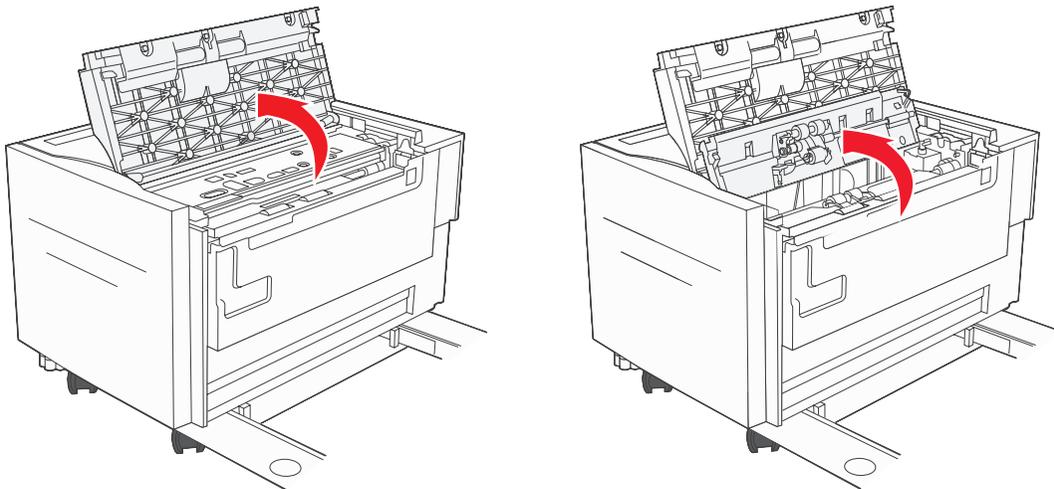

Calling for service

When you call for printer service, describe the problem you are experiencing, the message on the display, and the troubleshooting steps you have already taken to find a solution.

You need to know your printer model type and serial number. See the label on the printer for this information.

The serial number is also listed on the menu settings page. See **Printing the menu settings page on page 64** for more information.

For service in the U.S. or Canada, call 1-800-Lexmark (1-800-539-6275). See our Lexmark Web site at www.lexmark.com for the numbers for other countries/regions.

Note: When calling for service, call from the location of the printer.

Checking an unresponsive printer

If your printer is not responding, first make sure:

- The power cord is plugged into the printer and a properly grounded electrical outlet.
- The electrical outlet is not turned off by any switch or breaker.
- The printer is not plugged into any surge protectors, uninterrupted power supplies, or extension cords.
- Other electrical equipment plugged into the outlet is working.
- The printer is turned on.
- The printer cable is securely attached to the printer and the host computer, print server, option, or other network device.

Once you have checked each of these possibilities, turn the printer off and back on. This often fixes the problem.

Solving option problems

If an option does not operate correctly after it is installed or if it quits working:

- Turn the printer off, wait for about 10 seconds, and turn the printer on. If this does not fix the problem, unplug the printer, and check the connection between the option and printer.
- Print the menu settings page, and check to see if the option is listed in the Installed Options list. If the option is not listed, reinstall it. See **Printing the menu settings page on page 64** for more information.
- Make sure the option is selected in the software application you are using.

For Macintosh computer users: Make sure the printer is set up in Chooser.

The following table lists printer options and suggested corrective actions for related problems. If the suggested corrective action does not fix the problem, call your service representative.

Adjusting operator panel brightness and contrast

The LCD operator panel contrast and brightness can be adjusted through the Utilities menu. For more information, see the *Menus and Messages Guide*.

The LCD Brightness and LCD Contrast settings are adjusted separately. To change the LCD Brightness or LCD Contrast settings:

- 1 Make sure your printer is on.
- 2 Press  on the operator panel.
- 3 Press  until  **Settings** appears, and then press .
- 4 Press  until  **Utilities Menu** appears, and then press .
- 5 Press  until  appears next to the LCD setting you want to change, and then press .
- 6 Press  to increase the brightness or contrast or press  to decrease the brightness or contrast.
- 7 When the adjustment is complete, press .

This saves this setting as the new user default and the printer returns to **Ready**.

Disabling operator panel menus

Since many people could be using the printer, an administrator may choose to lock the operator panel menus to keep others from changing menu settings from the operator panel.

To disable the operator panel menus so that changes cannot be made to the printer default settings:

- 1 Turn the printer off.

Note: Disabling the operator panel menus does not prevent access to Print and Hold functionality.

- 2 Press and hold  and  while turning the printer on.

- 3 Release both buttons when **Performing Self Test** appears on the display.

The printer performs its power-on sequence, and then **Config Menu** appears on the first line of the display.

- 4 Press  until  **Panel Menu** appears, and then press .

- 5 Press  until  **Disable** appears, and then press .

The following messages appear briefly: **Submitting Selection** and **Disabling Menus**. The operator panel returns to **Panel Menu**.

- 6 Press  until  **Exit Config Menus** appears, and then press .

Activating Menu Changes appears. The menus are disabled.

Resetting the Printer appears briefly followed by a clock. The operator panel then returns to **Ready**.

Enabling operator panel menus

- 1 Turn the printer off.
- 2 Press and hold  and  while turning the printer on.
- 3 Release both buttons when **Performing Self Test** appears on the display.
The printer performs its power-on sequence, and then **Config Menu** appears on the first line of the display.
- 4 Press  until  **Panel Menu** appears, and then press .
- 5 Press  until  **Enable** appears, and then press .
- The following messages appear briefly in succession: **Submitting Selection** and **Enabling Menus**.
The operator panel returns to **Panel Menu**.
- 6 Press  until  **Exit Config Menu** appears, and then press .
- Activating Menu Changes** appears. The menus are enabled.
Resetting the Printer appears briefly followed by a clock. The operator panel then returns to **Ready**.

Restoring factory default settings

When you first enter the printer menus from the operator panel, you may notice an asterisk (*) to the left of a value in the menus. This asterisk indicates the *factory default setting*. These settings are the original printer settings. (Factory defaults may vary for different regions.)

When you select a new setting from the operator panel, **Submitting Selection** appears. When the Submitting Selection message disappears, an asterisk appears next to the setting to identify it as the current *user default setting*. These settings are active until new ones are stored or the factory defaults are restored.

To restore the original printer factory default settings:

Warning: All downloaded resources (fonts, macros, and symbol sets) in printer memory (RAM) will be deleted. (Resources residing in flash memory or on the optional hard disk remain unaffected.)

- 1 Make sure the printer is on and **Ready** appears on the display.
- 2 Press  on the operator panel.
- 3 Press  until  **Settings** appears, and then press .
- 4 Press  until  **Setup Menu** appears, and then press .
- 5 Press  until  **Factory Defaults** appears, and then press .
- 6 Press  until  **Restore Now** appears, and then press .
- 7 The message **Restoring Factory Defaults** appears, followed by the **Ready** message.

When you select Restore:

- No other button actions are available on the operator panel while **Restoring Factory Defaults** appears.
- All menu settings return to the factory default values, except:
 - The operator panel Display Language setting in the Setup menu.
 - All settings in the Parallel menu, Serial menu, Network menu, and USB menu.

Adjusting Power Saver

To adjust the **Power Saver** setting:

- 1 Make sure the printer is on and **Ready** appears on the display.
- 2 Press  on the operator panel.
- 3 Press  until  **Settings** appears, and then press .
- 4 Press  until  **Setup Menu** appears, and then press .
- 5 Press  until  **Power Saver** appears, and then press .
- 6 Using the numeric pad or the right and left arrows on the operator panel, enter the number of minutes for the printer to wait before entering Power Saver.

The settings available range from 2–240 minutes. If you want to turn Power Saver off, see **Disabling Power Saver on page 106**.

- 7 Press .

Submitting Selection appears.

Note: You can also adjust the Power Saver setting by issuing a Printer Job Language (PJL) command. For more information, see the *Technical Reference* available on our Lexmark Web site at www.lexmark.com.

Disabling Power Saver

Disabling Power Saver is a two step process. First, you must turn the variable on, and then select the variable. To disable Power Saver:

- 3 Release both buttons when **Performing Self Test** appears on the display.

- 5 Press  until  **off** appears, and then press .
- Submitting Selection** appears.
The operator panel returns to **Energy Conserve**.
- 6 Press  until  **Exit Config Menus** appears, and then press .
- Resetting the Printer** appears briefly followed by a clock. The operator panel then returns to **Ready**.
- 7 Make sure **Ready** appears.
- 8 Press  on the operator panel.
- 9 Press  until  **Settings** appears, and then press .
- 10 Press  until  **Setup Menu** appears, and then press .
- 11 Press  until  **Power Saver** appears, and then press .
- 12 Use either the numeric keypad or the right and left arrows to enter **0** (zero). **Disabled** appears, and then press .
- Submitting Selection** appears. Power Saver is now disabled.

Encrypting the disk

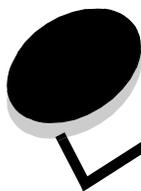

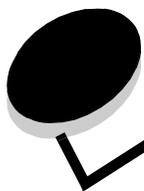
